### Funeral Services Held For La Grange Principal

LA GRANGE — Prof. Emmett Rently Frink, 42, for 19 years principal of the La Grange High School died at his home Sunday May 6 of a heart attack. At his death a friend said "His life and achievements have been stamped indelibly on the minds of the local high school and in the hearts of citizens throughout the state. Eastern Carolina had an educator, pioneer citizen, a Christian and a devoted believer and practitioner of the true principles of democracy in his passing".

He helped build the school over the period of years to 34 teachers and more than 1,100 students. He received his education at the State Teachers' College, Fayetteville, Johnson C. Smith University, Charlotte, North Carolina College, Durham, and Atlanta University, Atlanta. He was a member of the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, a Free and Accepted Mason and a Boy Scout official. He organized, supervised and taught the Young Men's Bible Class, one of the outstanding groups in La Grange and was presi-

dent of the Lenoir County unit of the North Carolina Teachers Association. James A. Broady, whose recent one-man show of paintings and works of sculpture at Richard B. Harrison Library, was well received by art lovers of Raleigh and vicinity. Mr. Broady has been for the last six years head of the Art Department of Shaw University. Prior to coming to Shaw, he taught for three years in the public school

system of West Virginia. He received his early training in the public schools of West Virginia, received the B. S. degree from Bluefield State College in W. Virginia, and the M. A. from Columbia University in New York. He has done work beyond the M. A. degree at Columbia and studied for nine weeks at the Skowhegan School of Sculpture in Skowhegan, Maine.

In recognition of his special abilities, Mr. Broady received a scholarship at Teachers College, Columbia University in 1944 and studied on a scholarship at Showegan.

Prior to his exhibition at the Richard B. Harrison Library, one of his paintings "Mother and Child" and shown in the Summer Show, Barnett Aden Gallery, Washington, D. C. Another of his paintings "Across Lake Waccamaw" was accepted for exhibition in the North Carolina Artists Competition Show in 1951 at the State Art Gallery in Raleigh.

"Jim" Broady finds expression in various media, watercolor and oil paintings, clay modeling and pottery, sculpture, wood and metal working including jewelry designing, silk screen and various small craft.

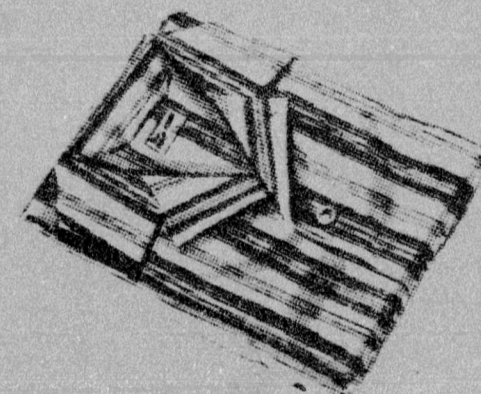

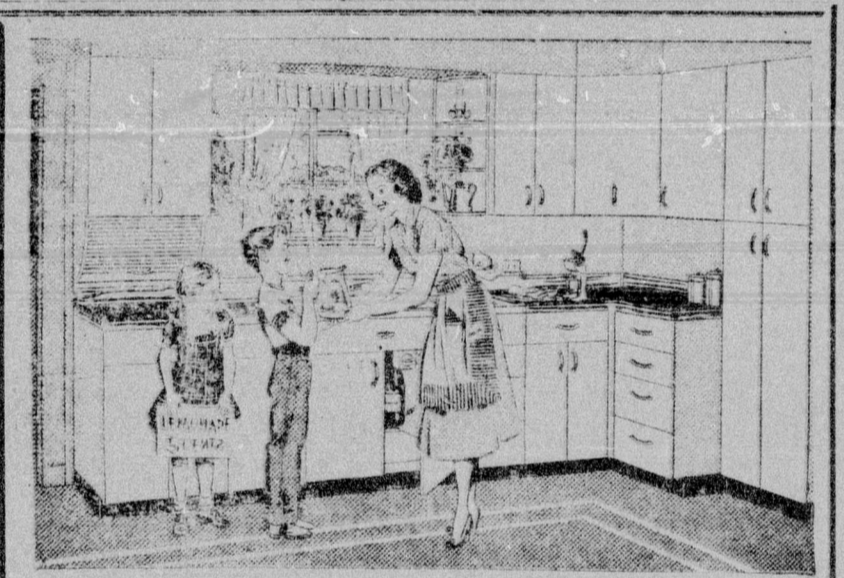
