Ministers Confab, Other Events Ended At Shaw U.

RALEIGH — Friday June 15, marked the conclusion of the 15th annual Ministers' Conference and 14th annual Women's Missionary Training Conference held at Shaw University. The closing message was delivered by the Rev. D. N. Lickrish, associate minister, Abyssinian Baptist Church, New York City. In his topic "Let Us Begin Again," he opened by saying "Adventure is the Mother of Progress all that we are, all that we hope to be, is made by adventure."

"Life," he said, "is only a series of adventures culminating in success and failures." "We must not forget," he continued, "The Emancipation Proclamation, as this was the oasis in the desert of American history by which we discovered the power of God in directing the universe and directing the destiny of the Negro people over the world."

In conclusion he said, "we have lost our ideology of God. We must bring back the concept of the true God." Remember that the Christian has the right to independent investigation and interpretation of the Bible. "As you come to begin again, begin with the word of God."

The speaker was introduced by Dr. J. T. Hairston, institute chairman of Greensboro.

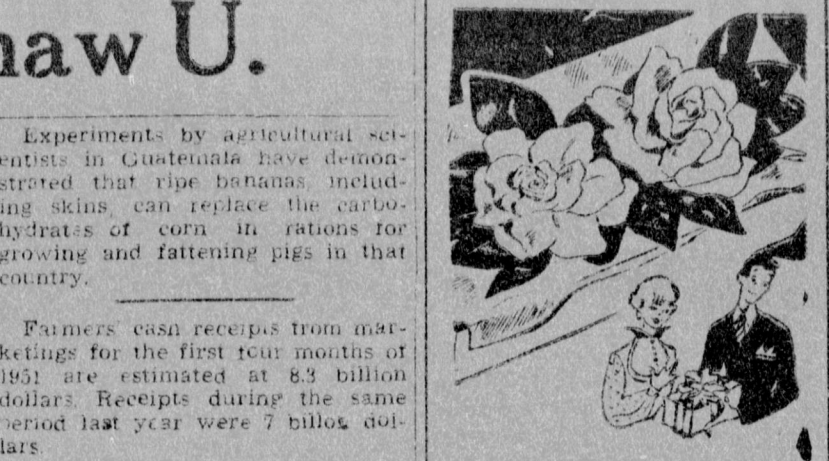
