## Shoe Shine Permits Required After July 1

Lewyn Hayes, Boys Probation Counselor of the Domestic Relations Court, announces that shoe shine permits have arrived and are on sale at that office in the new county building on the corner of Davie and McDowell Streets. Boys who are in the age range from 12 to 16 are eligible to purchase these permits. The cost is 50 cents. All Boys shining shoes will be required to exhibit these permits beginning July 1, 1951. Parents are urged to cooperate by seeing that their boys have these permits before allowing them to shine shoes on the streets.

## Standards Discussed On Hospitals And Institutions

WASHINGTON — Standards for nursing homes and other institutions that care for needy aged and handicapped people were discussed at a meeting in the Federal Security Building here by health and welfare officials representing 12 Federal and State agencies an eight national voluntary organizations.

The meeting was called by Miss Jane M. Hoey, Director of the Bureau of Public Assistance, Federal Security Agency to help the agency develop policies for carrying out one of the new social security amendments.

Under this amendment States must establish standards in order to secure Federal matching funds for public assistance payments to eligible persons in private and public nursing and convalescent homes and in hospitals. Although it is not effective until July 1, 1953, many states are already developing plans for licensing and inspection of institutions from fire hazards, programs that will protect inmates overcrowding, and unsanitary conditions.

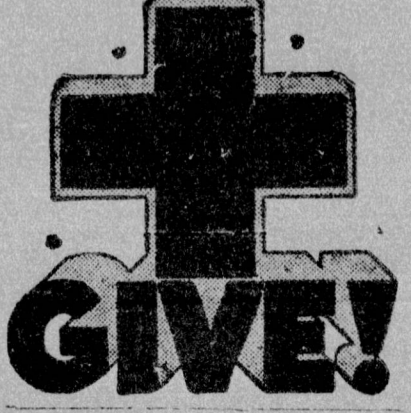
