SILVER LEAF TO MAJ. GRONES OF 555 A. I. R.

FORT BRAGG - The 505th Airborne Infantry Regiment welcomed a new Lieutenant Colonel to its ranks as Major Dow S. Grone, former 505th Regimental S-2 officer, and currently at the helm of the Third Battalion, received official notification of his promotion to Lieutenant Colonel. Prior to taking command of the Third Battalion of the 505th Colonel Grone had been assigned to the task of Regimental Intelligence and Public Information Officer, a position he held for approximately one month duration. Other important positions held by the Colonel during his tour of duty with the 505 include those of Third Battalion Executive Officer, Second Battalion Executive Officer, and Second Battalion Executive Officer. World War II saw the Colonel actively engaged with the famous cloak and dagger corps, the O. S. S. During his twenty-four months of overseas duty, the Colonel saw continuous action on the Northern and Southeastern Burma campaigns in the China, Burma, India Theaters of Operations. While in Burma, the Colonel participated on both a combat parachute jump, and a combat glider ride. Prior to entering the service of the Third Battalion, Colonel Grone resided at 64 Elmwood Place, Athens, Ohio. Upon completion of his high school education, Colonel Grone attended Ohio University for a period of two years, 1939 and 1940. While attending the University he studied extensively in the field of Architecture. Since joining the service at Athens, in 1940, the Colonel has received many impressive awards and decorations for his many achievements, some of which include the Legion of Merit, Bronze Star, Air Medal, and the Combat Infantry Badge. The Colonel and his wife, the former Miss Evelyn Dixon Dilard of Alexandria, Virginia, now resides in Fayetteville with their young daughter, Linda Mason, two months old.

JOBS OFFERED IN FEDERAL SERVICE

Booker T. Washington Birthplace Memorial maintains a field office at 418 F Street, N. W., Washington 4, D. C. RALEIGH - Into the mails went checks for 26,126 academic and vocational teachers, supervisors, principals and superintendent's base pay, minus Uncle Sam's 18 per cent, but still leaving North Carolina's school folks \$8,100,000 richer. Only 13 principals did not share in the plum, and all of them run big schools and get monthly checks in the \$500 range and were excluded because 1951-52 salary schedules do not call for pay increases in their jobs. The checks which averaged \$262.72, minus income tax deductions, represented the difference between what school teachers ac-

usually not during 1950-51 and a salary scale of \$2,000 to \$3,100 for "A" certificate teachers. The 1951 General Assembly made the funds available in backing up a promise by the 1949 Legislature. A total of \$2,305,547.05 in checks went out to school personnel in Raleigh and Wake County and \$279.95 to county teachers and \$102,294.19 to Raleigh city school personnel.

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Garden Time By ROBERT SCHMIDT. What is causing your tomatoes to rot on the blossom end of the small green fruits? A good question, and one that is easily answered. The trouble is known as blossom-end rot and is not caused by a disease organism but by dry weather and lack of moisture. I have seen as much as 50 per cent of a crop lost because of it. Prevent blossom-end rot by timely irrigation and mulching - but do it before you lose your crop. Have you planted your collard seed yet? It is time now to plant collard, cabbage, broccoli and Chinese cabbage seed for fall crop. In the Piedmont and Coastal Plain areas there is still time to set tomato plants for a late crop. The early crop usually does not last until October. Plantings of snapbeans, butterbeans, and sweet corn can also be made now. About this time of the year a few gardeners like to plant late Irish potatoes using small potatoes of their spring crop for seed. This difficulty comes in getting the early crop potatoes to sprout, since their rest period has not been broken. Sometimes they may be induced to sprout by spreading them out in the shade and letting them green up. Another way is to break the rest period by treating the seed with a chemical - Ethylene Chlorohydrin. This treatment is not successful if the weather is very hot. Ethylene Chlorohydrin may be obtained from some of the large seed firms in the South, and your county agent should be able to get you information concerning its use.
