



CHINESE KEPT COMING — Fighting not only to save his skin but his tankers as well, Master Sergeant Raeford W. Sanders of Fayetteville is shown waiting to be retrieved by the ordnance department as 17 men of the 64th Heavy Tank Battalion with which he was serving in Korea were shut off from the rest of the 3rd Division. Isolated in "no man's land" for three days and two nights of which went without trouble, the men witnessed mounting tension on the last night when Chinese refugees who kept streaming by told them there were many

Chinese behind them coming their way. A small band of Reds sneaked to a house where two men were sleeping, tossed a Bangalore torpedo through the window and injured one man, but after a brief fight the Reds were driven off. "The rest of the patrol had to leave us," Sgt. Sanders explained, "but they knew where we were. We were to wait for the ordnance retrievers to come. . . . Refugees kept streaming by and nearly all of them told us there were many, many Chinese behind them, coming our way." Sgt. Sanders is the son of Mr. and Mrs. N. W. Sanders of 822 S. Blount street, Raleigh.

DURHAM — Some call them "rag-time" or "Horatio Alger tunes." Still others call them manifestations of intellectual torridity.

The City of Durham calls this one a triumph of ability and sheer "guts" over circumstances.

And Durham is preparing to when on Friday night, August 10, the doors of the Durham City Armory open to welcome Durham's Great Mumford, starring with The Larks, the nation's most sensational vocal quintet.

When the city hails young Mumford at the Armory on the 10th, it will be writing a rousing climax to a story that came into being strangely enough in the same building some 2 years ago.

Back 13 years ago when Gene was a slightly-built, buck-toothed youth attending Lyon Park School in West End he showed promise of becoming the noted vocalist that he is today in a city-wide music festival at that time, the tiny child sang his way into the hearts of Durham's citizenry never to be removed therefrom.

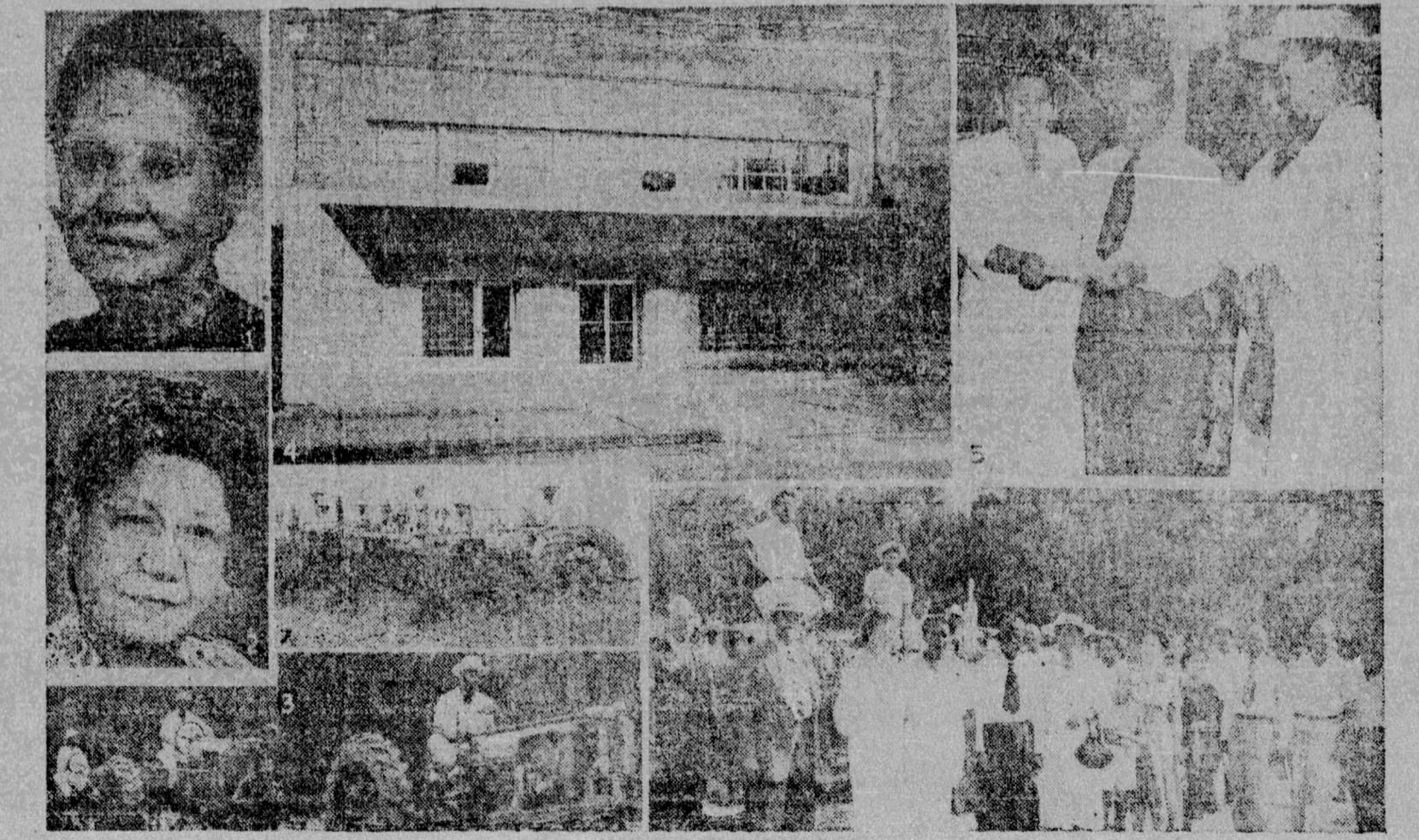

Then came a stint with the Internes Quartet, a chance at fame through the medium of radio. . . . still no fame—infamy. Following was a period with the Selah Jubilee Singers, recordings, personal appearances, theatre tours, concerts. . . . yet localized fame.

But through the haze which attempted to shroud the ambitions of a worthy artist, a ray of hope shone.
