FIRST PAROCHIA L APPOINTEE IN STATE WILL SPEAK DURING EVENT

Forty Hours Devotion Will Begin At St. Monica's Church At Raleigh October 14

RALEIGH — The Reverend Peter Carter, assistant priest at Christ the King Church in High Point, will deliver a series of sermons during Forty Hours Devotion beginning October 14 at St. Monica's Catholic Church here. The evening devotions will begin at 8:00 p.m. on October 14, 15 and 16. The devotion will open after the 11:00 a.m. High Mass this Sunday. The Reverend John S. Dillon, O. P., is pastor of the local church. Father Carter has received the distinction of being the first Negro priest to receive a parochial appointment in North Carolina. He is the son of a practicing physician in Virginia, and was ordained to the priesthood in May of this year in Buffalo, New York. In his youth the priest studied at Tuskegee Institute, Alabama, and later obtained a bachelor of arts degree from the University of Michigan. While at the university he became interested in the Faith and was received in the Catholic Church. (Continued on page 8)

Clinton Woman Winner in 100,000th Stove Contest

CLINTON — When Mrs. Helen Wadsworth, homemaker of Clinton, Route 5, decided a quit cooking with wood and buy an electric range, she never guessed the decision would be worth \$216.25 to her. But this week she got exactly that, the purchase price of the range. The Sampson County farm woman purchased the 100,000th electric range to be installed in the territory served by Carolina Power and Light Company. Since August 1, a vigorous range-selling campaign had been waged among 581 dealers in the territory with a \$250 prize as the reward for the dealer who made the 100,000th sale. That dealer was Flake's Sales and Service of Clinton, operated by John H. and R. L. Flake. Established service station operators, they have been in the appliance business less than six months. Paratroopers, To Be Returned To State To Face Trial In Mass Criminal Attack

CARTHAGE — Six white paratroopers have confessed the mass rape of a Negro matron near here and will be returned to the area to face military and possible civilian trial during the weekend, it has been learned. The six men, stationed at Camp Campbell, Ky., confessed to officials at the Kentucky camp that they criminally assaulted Mrs. Lula Mae Artist, resident of Carthage and New York, as she was returning from a church meeting near here on August 15. FEDERAL COURT HEAR ARGUMENTS FOR 4 DOOMED TO GAS CHAMBER

Attorneys Taylor and Price Scheduled To Present Arguments Before Tribunal

RALEIGH — The fate of four North Carolina Negro men, doomed to die in the lethal chamber at the State Penitentiary here, will be decided in the Fourth Circuit Court of Appeals at Richmond, Va. Friday when the cases are to be argued. The cases to be heard by the Federal tribunal are those involving Bennie and Lloyd Rae Daniels, youthful cousins convicted in Pitt County for the robbery-slitting of a white Greenville taxicab driver; Raleigh Speller, who was convicted of criminally assaulting a white woman in Winston and Clyde Brown, convicted of the rape of a young white girl at Winston-Salem. In all three cases, convictions have been upheld by the North Carolina Supreme Court, and the U. S. Supreme Court has refused to review them. Lawyers for the four then carried their fight back to Federal Court through petitions for writs of habeas corpus. They contended that Negroes were discriminated against in the selection of juries that tried the four, federal District Judge Don Gilliam recently dismissed their petitions. The lawyers then appealed his decision to the Circuit Court. Assistant Atty. General Ralph Moody, Highway Commission General Counsel Brooks Peters and E. O. Brogden, Prison Department lawyer, will represent the State at the hearing. TAYLOR, PRICE LAWYERS Scheduled to argue the cases for upholding the appeals are Attorneys Herman L. REIDSVILLE — Lem Montgomery, 40, a cab driver, has been indicted on a charge of possessing nontaxpaid whisky for the purpose of sale, police disclosed this week. A report said officers raided Montgomery's home at 117 Ridge Street during the week end, found 30 gallons of bottles, whisky in half-gallon fruit jars stored in the basement of the house. The whisky was seized and Montgomery was placed under arrest. Later, Montgomery, who operates his cab business under the name, "Lem's Taxi," was released under a bond of \$250 pending a trial in Recorder's Court here next week.
