Money, Murder

LAURENBERG — An argument over money Sunday led to the axe murder of a Scotland County man. Sheriff Jesse C. Gibson said Duick McCoy, 27, is charged with the murder of Raymond Hall, 37, tenant farmer. According to Deputy Sheriff B. P. Lyten, Hall was stabbed and then hit in the head with an axe as he lay in the yard at his home near Johns. The deputy said witnesses told him that the slaying followed an argument over money allegedly owed McCoy.

Boy Kills Brother, 6 In Shooting

GREENVILLE — Ebert Brown, Jr., six-year-old youth, was instantly killed Tuesday morning from a blast of a 12-gauge shotgun in the hands of his nine-year-old brother, William Davis Brown. Both are sons of Mr. and Mrs. Elbert Brown who live on Thomas Williams' farm on Robersonville, Route 2.

Pitt. County Coroner Griffin H. Rouse, stated that at the time of the accident the two boys were alone in their home. The shotgun blast entered the back of the younger brother and went all the way through his body.

Neighbors rushed to the scene at the report of the blast and screams of the older youth and they found the child lying on the floor in one of the rooms of the house.

HOSPITAL MAY EMPLOY SECOND IN 55 YEARS

Race No Issue As Hospital Seeks Capable Person

RALEIGH — The possibility that Raleigh's Saint Agnes Hospital may appoint the second Negro administrator in its 55-year history seemed less remote this week when it was learned that the current administrator of the institution, William Acton, is resigning his post effective November 15, and that the hospital's board of directors favors the naming of the "most qualified" man to the post, regardless of racial designation.

White administration of the hospital, the only one serving Wake County's vast Negro population, has long been a sore-spot in the general public-institution relation of the hospital to this populace.

This newspaper has been joined by numerous civic and fraternal organizations as well as diverse individuals in its contention that the role of administrator of the hospital should be played by a person who is both capable of the on-site administration as well as being able to pursue the "public" (Continued on page 8)

trance of the hospital as the young mother made a valiant effort to enter the institution before the dual birth.

She waited "just a little too long," hospital attaches say.

The first of the two girls was born in the cab before members of the staff of the hospital could reach the mother.

Six GIs Who Raped Race Matron To Be Tried In Moore County High Court

CARTHAGE — Six white paratroopers accused in the mass rape of a Negro woman near here on August 15, are to face trial in Moore County Superior Court during its January sitting, it was revealed here this week.

The men, five of whom are said to be Northerners and the other from Georgia, are being detained at their Army base at Camp Campbell, Ky., pending date of their hearing.

The men, one of whom has made a written confession while the other five have orally admitted taking part in the incident, are accused of having criminally assaulted Mrs. Lula Mae Arles, who lists her home as Baltimore, but who is a native of this area. (Continued on page 8)

Numbers Crackdown Is On --- Big Shot Fined \$500

RALEIGH — A man who has been tabbed one of Raleigh "big time numbers operators" paid a \$500 fine this week on being found guilty of possession of gambling devices (to wit: numbers tickets), and was given a 12-year road sentence suspended on the condition that he violate no law for two years.

The sentence, meted out by City Court Judge Albert Doub, was appealed to Superior Court

when a \$500 bond was posted by the defendant. Shared in what local authorities term a major web of crackdowns on numbers operators was Robb Lee Taylor who reportedly has a local court record dating back ten years.

MAKES \$100 WEEKLY — Taylor, who says he earns approximately \$100 per week as his five per cent commission as a numbers "pick up man," was arrested by detectives here early last week.

He reportedly was apprehended in a supermarket parking lot and was relieved of a bag he had containing about 380 numbers slips valued at approximately \$300.

Cash amounting to \$32.50 was also found on this person. The slips were ordered destroyed by Judge Doub, who also ordered (Continued on page 8)

Church Group Supporting Intergration And NAACP

OXFORD — The 64th Stated Session of the Catawba Synod, Presbyterian Church USA, meeting with the Timothy Darling Presbyterian Church here last week went on record as endorsing fully the Church's pronounced program of total integration of the colored wing of the church into the main body which boasts over two million communicants whose off-pledged pledge is "an integrated church in an integrated society."

Some 70-odd laymen and ministers from the presbyteries of Cape Fear, Southern Virginia, Yadkin and Catawba heard retiring Moderator, Rev. O. J. Hawkins of Wil-

son, N. C. give his address and participated in the Communion services administered by Dr. Herman S. Davis, Sr., host minister, assisted by Revs. L. B. Washington and E. J. Johnson. Words of eulogy were said for deceased ministers, Revs. Hill, H. L. McCrorey, Carter, and C. H. Shute.

PETERSON NEW MODERATOR — Elected the new Moderator was the Rev. J. D. Peterson of Winston-Salem and Rev. J. E. McMullan, Sanford, was chosen vice moderator.

The Synod composed of 161 churches and 116 ministers, in addition to its endorsement of inte-

gration, passed a resolution endorsing the program "the NAACP for its splendid work of breaking down the walls of segregation through the media of moral persuasion and legal redress."

The Synod further resolved that "all our churches set aside a Sunday to especially emphasize N. A. A. C. P.'s work and pledge our support to this worthwhile organization." This marked the first time in recent years the Presbyterians have come out for N. A. A. C. P.

Rev. J. T. Douglass of Greensboro fathered the resolution which was presented by (Continued on page 8)
