## Raleigh Worker Electrocuted

Television Workman Dies When Hot Wire Strikes Equipment

RALEIGH — A Negro television antenna installer and tester and a white man helping him were killed instantly here last Friday afternoon when they came in contact with a high-voltage wire while making a TV test.

Both Clarence Burt, 36, the Negro workman and Charlton Miskelly, 54, the white man, were electrocuted when an estimated 7,200 volts of electricity coursed through their veins when the portable TV antenna they were handling came into contact with the "hot" wire.

OTHER MAN STUNNED  
Coroner's reports say that the two men, employees of Mangum Electrically Company, were making a test to determine television reception when the tragedy occurred.

Another man, Charles Phillips, was knocked down by the force of the shock, but suffered no ill effects.

## TOP OPERATOR IN THE EAST DRAWS TERM

"Big Shot", Wife And Two Others Sentenced, Fined

WILMINGTON — Earl Lewis Black, who has gained state-wide repute as a "kingpin" in the flourishing numbers lottery racket, was sentenced to an 18-month prison sentence in Superior Court here this week. At the same time his wife drew a fine and two Negro "assistants" also were fined and placed on probation.

Black, known as a "banker" of numbers throughout the Eastern sector of North Carolina, had originally been sentenced to serve a one-year prison term after having been found guilty in a lower court here of participating in a lottery. The Superior Court, however, tacked an additional six months onto the term.

Black, who is said to be "The East Man" in North Carolina numbers in the same manner that "Crip" Smith was known as "The State Man", heard his wife sentenced to a 12 months sentence suspended on payment of a \$1000 fine and "not to be seen in North Carolina" for five years, and then saw two of his "operators", Mrs. Florence Howard and Edward Jacobs, both Negroes, receive sentences.

Jacobs was sentenced to one year in prison suspended upon the payment of a \$500 fine and five-year probation. Mrs. Howard received a six-months sentence suspended upon payment.

## CEREMONY WILL BE ON SITE OF PROJECT 4 P. M.

Name of School To Be Revealed During Ground - Breaking

RALEIGH — Ground-breaking ceremonies will be held on the site of the projected new "Million dollar" Negro Junior and senior high school here at 4 p.m. Tuesday, November 13, it was announced this week.

At the time of the ground-breaking exercises, it was further learned, the school will be officially named.

According to F. J. Carnage, noted attorney and sole Negro member of the local school board, the school's governing board has given the "go ahead" sign for the ground-breaking event.

Expected to participate in the event are representatives of the Negro Citizens Committee, the Inter-denominational Ministerial Alliance and representative of various civic and fraternal groups.

Since early last week, townspeople have been wracking their collective brains to determine a suitable name for the structure to be constructed on Lenoir Street just east of the Chavis Heights Housing Project.

Already several individuals and groups have submitted names for the edifice to the (Continued on page 8)

## Attorney Will Renew Effort To Save Four Men

RALEIGH — Attorney Herman Taylor said this week that he is "certain" that appeals will be made to the U. S. Supreme Court from decisions denying writs of habeas corpus to four North Carolina men under death sentence at Central Prison here.

A Baltimore federal court of appeals refused Monday to intervene in state trials and convictions of Bennie and Lloyd Ray Daniels, Raleigh Speller, and Clyde Brown. All appeals had charged discrimination against Negroes in the selection of juries. The Daniels' appeal also involved a court argument over a lower court dismissal (Continued on page 8)

WILMINGTON — It's no lie here this week that a local woman faces imprisonment for engaging in the time-tested violence of tossing lye at a suitor.

Judge John J. Burney sentenced Miss Rosa Lee Galloway, 19, to two years in prison after she was found guilty in New Hanover Superior Court here this week of tossing acid into the eyes of James Hall.

Miss Galloway says that Hall had twice assaulted her and on the day of the lye-tossing told her that he would "kill" her. Hall, sporting a large patch over his eyes, denied this.

### Keeps Silent

NEW BERN — The son of a wealthy manufacturing family is keeping silent in jail here this week as evidence keeps piling up to connect him with the death of a Negro who had been a tenant farmer on his huge plantation near here.

Newton Hanes, a member of the wealthy Hanes banking and textile manufacturing family refused to discuss with officers just how clothing belonging to Ishmon Simmons, 40, the tenant, whose body was found in Hanes' station-wagon during the weekend, happened to be in his possession.

Neither would Hanes offer evidence on how Simmons' body, with a hole from a small calibre bullet in his head, was found in the auto. The wealthy gentleman-farmer, is being held without bond pending inquest Friday.

## NC LIEUTENANT DIES IN KOREA

WINTON — The War Department announced this week that Lt. Travis Banks of 517 Vance St., Greenville, was killed in action in Korea on October 3. Lt. Banks left the United States on September 10 and less than a month later was killed in combat. He was assigned to Co. G 7th Cavalry Regiment of the 1st Cavalry Division.

He served in World War II for two years with ten months of this service in Alaska. He was recalled to service February 3, 1951 as a reserve officer.

# Home Plans Boosted As N. C. Baptists Hold Meet

HIGH POINT — Approximately 600 Baptist messengers, representing 1700 Baptist churches and membership of more than 300,000 members in the First Baptist Church, here October 30 through November 1, vigorously protested the recent action of President Harry Truman in nominating an ambassador to the Vatican in Rome.

In a strongly worded letter to the President, the body asserted: "The General Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, representing 300,000 Baptists, looks with grave concern upon any infringement of

the first amendment to the Federal Constitution, and therefore, protests the action of the President of the United States in nominating an ambassador to the Vatican in Rome."

Accepting a recommendation of its president, Dr. P. A. Bishop of Rich Square, the organization voted to proceed as promptly as possible with the erection of its new Baptist Headquarters Building at a cost of \$122,000. Property was purchased at a cost of \$16,000, and in October the building committee accepted a bid from the P. S. West Construction of Statesville to erect the structure.

The body also accepted proposals to launch a two weeks' rally for \$10,000 as a special Founder's Day gift to Shaw University; the creation of an office of Promotional Secretary of Evangelism; and revision of a plan of ministerial retirement.

According to a report of the Rev. O. L. Sherrill, executive secretary, receipts from churches during the year for Missions and Christian Education amounted to \$114,248.59. Over \$500.00 was received during the three-day session on next year's receipts. Included in receipts were gifts from the Woman's Baptist State Con-

vention of \$500,000 and the Beulah Baptist Association of \$600.00.
