At the same time his wife drew a fine and two Negro "assistants" also were fined nd placed on probation.

Black, known as a "banker" numbers throughout the lina, had originally been sentenced to serve a one-year prison term after having been found guilty in a lower court here of participating in a lottery. The Superior Court. however, tacked an additional six months onto the term.
