Naming of schools is a chore usually relegated to the City School Board. In the case of the edifice now under construction, however, the majority of persons contacted in an exhaustive survey through this newspaper, feel that citizens-at-large should have an opportunity to express their opinion relative to a name for the million dollar institution.

## National Championship In Football Awarded Aggies

## NEW TEST OF SCHOOLS BIAS IS PLANNED

COLUMBIA, S. C. — The NAACP is interested in improved schools in still another Clarendon county school district, and is already backing a pending case on appeal to the U. S. Supreme Court to determine whether Negroes in Clarendon's Summerton District should have schools equal to those of whites or attend school with white pupils.

The NAACP has already appealed the 2-1 federal special district court decision which ruled that equal school facilities were in order and should be provided, and State NAACP Chapter President James M. Hinton Sunday made public a letter he has written to L. E. McCord, Clarendon county superintendent of schools, asking equal school facilities in the county's school district at Manning.

Parents and students in the Manning district petitioned McCord last week for equal school facilities for Negroes in the district, contending that Negro school facilities are inferior, and Hinton said in his letter the NAACP will support the Manning petition, and asked for a reply.

## Once-Beaten Eleven Rated Best In Nation

RALEIGH — The Aggies football team of A & T College, Greensboro, was this week accorded mythical national football championship honors by the Associated Negro Press of which THE CAROLINIAN is a member.

In the same tabulation, the Eagles of North Carolina College, Durham, were accorded eighth place rating.

The official notification that the A & T team had been accorded national laurels came Tuesday in the ANP's official release which stated:

"The Aggies rate as the best team in the nation despite an upset loss to Virginia State College in the Capital Classics held in Washington, D.C. in October and no earlier than Florida A & M College."

**FIRST IN HISTORY**  
Even though the Aggies failed to regain championship honors in the Central Intercollegiate Athletic Association (CIAA) of which they are a member and were top team during the 1950 season, the ANP poll found the Greensboro eleven the only team eligible for the national championship, allocated.

The awarding of the championship to the Aggies marks the first time that the team has been so honored.

**COACH COMMENTS**  
Head Coach William (Bill) Bell of A & T made the following observation upon being notified of the championship, he said:

"We are very happy about the good news, for these boys deserve every bit of the honor. I have felt all season that this team, man for man, is the very best that I have ever had in my 19 years of coaching. Even (Continued on page 8)

# Nashville Woman Leaps From Window; Succumbs

## Duke Hospital Site Of Fatal Plunge

DURHAM — A 44-year-old woman died Monday as the result of injuries received when she leaped from a fourth floor window at Duke Hospital here.

Funeral services were being arranged at Rocky Mount Tuesday for Mrs. Mary Kearney, a native of Nashville, who jumped from the window of her room at the hospital Thanksgiving Day shortly following a conference with hospital staff physicians.

**UNDERWENT OPERATION**  
Mrs. Kearney, who entered the nationally-famed hospital on November 15 and underwent an operation for a female disorder a few days before the holiday, broke both of her legs in the leap and re-opened the incision from the operation.

She lingered between death from Thursday through Monday when she expired.

In addition to the leg injuries, shock and the rupture of the incision, physicians also revealed that Mrs. Kearney suffered internal injuries and a cerebral concussion from the leap.

**REASON UNKNOWN**  
No reason for the woman's act could be learned from hospital officials or relatives. As a result of the operation, Mrs. Kearney would have been able to live a "comparatively normal" life, it was learned, and no domestic or economic reason for her act was disclosed by relatives or acquaintances.

Even though the fatal leap was actually from a fourth floor window, the fall was five stories because the woman fell into a base (Continued on page 8)

## STUDENTS BACK AT HIGH SCHOOL AFTER STRIKING

KINSTON — The 720 students who staged a walk-out strike at Kinston's Adkins High School last Tuesday were back in classes at the school early this week, but only as a gesture of good faith pending next Monday's meeting with school board representatives, it was learned.

The students, who walked out of school Tuesday morning before classes began, remained out Wednesday and then too. Thanksgiving Day Ho'day Thursday and Friday and they will vote their own minds again at Monday's meeting with the 13-member Board of Commissioners.

Last week's strike, called by the student council, was in protest of inadequate classroom space, lack of a vocational training building, lack of adequate athletic facilities and inadequacy of home economics training facilities. (Continued on page 8)

OXFORD — The alleged leaders of a gang of break-in artists referred to by local police officials as "Crime, Inc." have been arrested here this week and are to be charged with a series of break-ins, burglaries and robberies.

City police and sheriff's officers combined forces Monday to bring into custody four young men said to be the leaders of the group which has been terrorizing Oxford and the surrounding area for more than six weeks with robberies and break-ins, sometimes at the rate of two a week at the same place.
