
By all means, creating friendship with the public means a great deal to any business.



The leaflet, which made its appearance after it was revealed that Army Intelligence officers, local, state and federal investigators and others were investigating the bombardment of the NCC College campus, charges that investgating agencies acted with greater speed to investigate the circular than such agencies would have if there had been a lynching, or a "Negro's home bombed," or a "Negro wom-
