

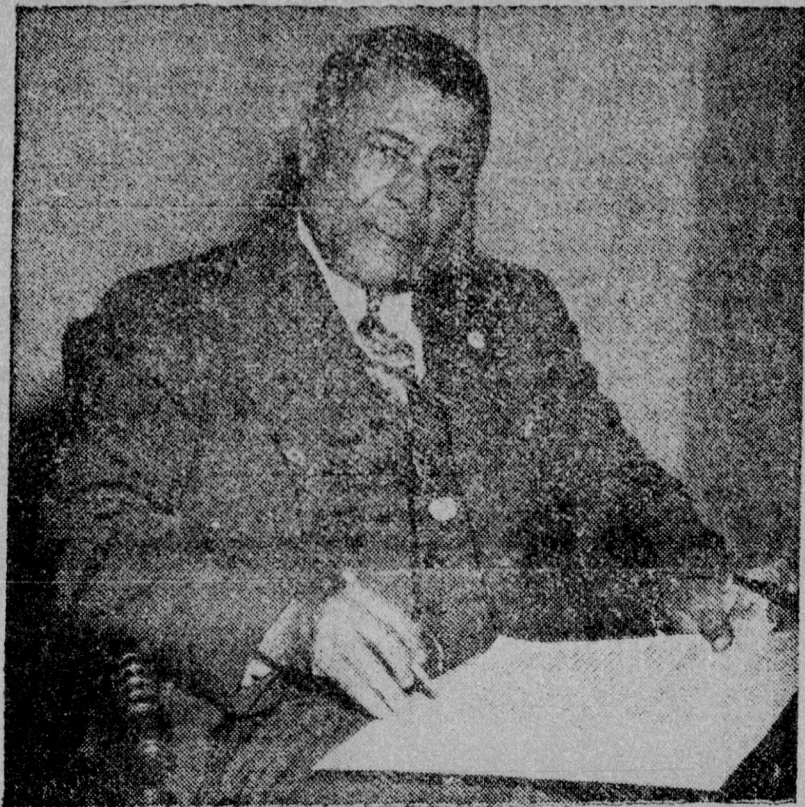

EXALTED RULER OF ELKS, NOTED RECTOR DEAD

Wilson Ruled Elks 30 Years; Rector On College Board

RALEIGH — Death came to two men, one prominent in religious circles, the other top official of a nationwide fraternal movement during the past week.
Dr. John Walter Herritage, whose reputation as an Episcopalian churchman reached national proportions, died at the age of 63 at a Charlotte, N. C. hospital Sunday night.

POLICE SEEK CLASS-MATE IN RAPE-MURDER

Rutherfordton Girl Victim of Brutal Killer in Capital

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The bullet-riddled, criminally-assaulted body of a 19-year-old North Carolina native, Howard University co-ed, was discovered on a Washington street Monday night. The discovery immediately set into operation a 13-state-wide hunt for one of the victim's classmates.
Victim of the assault-murder was identified as Miss Janet Ellen King, daughter of Mrs. Mary Bribelle King of Route 2, Rutherfordton. She was formerly a student at A&T College, Greensboro.
CHOKED, RAPED, SHOT
According to police, the young victim was choked, criminally assaulted, shot three times and then thrown from a speeding car in the vicinity of the National Arboretum.
The car in which the murder allegedly took place was later found deserted on a city street.
Inside the blood-stained automobile was found the girl's purse and under-clothes, and also school books in which the name of the youth sought in connection with the slaying was written.
SCHOOL MATE SOUGHT
The 13-state-wide manhunt now underway is aimed at Donald Tyler, 22-year-old classmate of Miss King.
Tyler was connected with the slaying when it was found that the automobile in which the rape-murdering was committed had last been driven by Tyler who had borrowed it from Raymond W. Elliot, a local druggist. The blood-stained books found in the car also contained Tyler's name.
IDENTITY TRACED
When first discovered, Miss King's body was clad in a black coat, red sweater and blue skirt. A label in the coat identified (Continued on page 8)

Reds Continue To Bombard N. C. C. With Propoganda



FAILURE FAILS TO FOIL REDS IN OPERATION NCC

Students, Faculty Ignore Propaganda Stemming from Reds

DURHAM—North Carolina Communists are this week continuing to bombard the campus of North Carolina College here with propaganda aimed at developing Red opinion on the campus despite the failure of an effort last week to curb a Red Cross Blood for Korea rally.
At the climax of a campus-wide blood rally last Friday, circulars labeled "Operation Blood-letting and Decrying the giving of blood for what the Reds termed America's 'Operation Killer' in Korea" were discovered.
On Tuesday circulars bearing the label "Operation 'Smokescreen'" were discovered on the campus. College officials feel that the circulars were distributed on the campus late Monday night or early Tuesday morning.
The most recent circular, in reference to the first pointedly asks "Why does a one page leaflet strike such terror in the ranks of war analysts and their agents?"
The leaflet, which made its appearance after it was revealed that Army Intelligence officers, local state and federal investigators and others were investigating the bombardment of the NCC College campus charges that investigating agencies acted with greater speed to investigate the circular than such agencies would have if there had been a luncheon or a "Negro's home bombed," or a "Negro woman raped."

The Question: Being comparatively young in the field, how can Negro Business stimulate and channel more buying power in its direction?

THE ANSWERS
Mrs. A. B. Alton, Nursery School Instructor, Raleigh, it is my belief that Negro business could stimulate and channel more buying power in its direction by carrying a larger and more complete stock of merchandise so that the customer might be able to find what he wants and needs.
With competition as strong as it is, the Negro MRS. ALSTON businessman should attempt to be as dependable, reliable and prompt with his services as possible. Also, he should take careful consideration in employing qualified and experienced operators, as they are representative of his business.

Mr. W. E. Peterson, State Employee, Raleigh: In my opinion, the Negro businessman should try to give the public what it wants or what he thinks it wants and needs. An attractive place of business is always a good drawing card, with courteous playing an important part in all business.
Advertisement is one of the essential means of stimulating any business. Also, it is necessary to carry a variety of stock for the business in question so that the public might have a choice of what they want.
By all means, creating friendship with the public means a great deal to any business.
Mrs. Marguerite Lightner, secretary, State Department, Raleigh: The modern business axiom to which Negro businesses must increasingly subscribe is spend dollars and save dollars. This does not, as one might off-hand think, contradict the adage that a penny saved is a penny earned. It merely points up with accounting logic the fact that savings are earned through expenditures which increase efficiency in any way.
This goal of striving for an improved business in tune with the times which correspondingly increases the flux of customers to most any type of business, necessarily involves expenditures. Many business men and Mrs. Lightner women are hesitant to make comments, feeling that a more opportune period for improvement may some day appear. But a mere point of time comparison is not a sound criterion.
Improvements in materials and techniques, new concepts of business practices, better equipment and methodology have advanced the frontier of efficiency in the business world—let the Negro business accept this fact as it seeks increased participation.

Hogs Rost, Dogs Hunt Bones In Oddfellow's Cemetery In Twin City

WINSTON-SALEM—Hogs, dogs and the souls of those gone on in the city proper, contains an undeterminable number of graves, some placed only a few inches apart.
Many of the newer graves and a great number of the older ones have either caved in about the edges of their occupants, or have been dug up by rooting hogs and dogs searching for bones.
In at least two distinct cases, the bodies of young babies have been discovered tossed into makeshift graves in the cemetery proper, and in at least one instance, a still-born baby's body was found in the cemetery with no apparent effort at burial having been made. (Continued on page 8)

Race Minister Talks To Two Mixed N. C. Groups

GREENSBORO, N. C. (AP)—The Rev. Morris H. Tynes, pastor of historic Mt. Zion Baptist Church of Staunton, Va., spoke twice at white churches in Greensboro last week. He spoke at the morning service at Greensboro Disciples of Christ Church where the Rev. William Parker is pastor.
Rev. Tynes, who is a graduate of Yale Divinity School, was a classmate of Rev. Parker. A large crowd was out to greet the speaker.
Rev. Mr. Tynes is the son of Dr. J. W. Tynes, who has been pastor of Providence Baptist Church, Greensboro, for 20 years.
In the afternoon Rev. Tynes was the guest speaker at First Presbyterian church for a service sponsored by the Greensboro Interracial Commission in observance of Brotherhood Week. The Rev. John Redhead is pastor of First Presbyterian Church.

Smith And Hoey Reveal Intentions To Fight All Civil Rights Legislation

WASHINGTON (Special)—A group of 13 persons representing the North Carolina branch of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People headed by state NAACP president Kelly Alexander of Charlotte Monday heard the state's two Senators pointedly reveal that neither would vote favorably on civil rights issues in Congress.
Both Senior Senator Clyde Hoey and Senator Willis Smith told the delegation, in Washington attending the annual NAACP Civil Rights Leadership Conference, that they would vote against any national anti-poll tax law.
The solons explained that they would vote unfavorably on these civil rights measures because they believed that either of the edicts would trespass on what the edicts "state's rights."
URGE JIM CROWED INDUSTRY
When the delegation pointed out that Negroes were being accorded the most menial jobs in North Carolina's multi-million dollar textile industry, Senator Smith suggested that Negroes establish an all-Negro textile mill to be operated in a manner similar to the all-colored banks in Durham and Raleigh, N. C.
The solons had no comment to make when NAACP head Alexander pointed out that the position to which a Negro is relegated in the State of North Carolina hindered him from opportunity to gain the funds with which to establish such a concern.
I AINT MAD WITH YOU
Senator Smith, who was selected to lead the delegation in wisdom by the delegation in wisdom if not in words, "ain't mad with you" in reference to the alleged Negro "bloke vote" against him during the campaign.
He said that during the campaign N. C. Negroes had been "misguided and misled."

CITIZENS WANT OUSTED MEDIC RE-INSTATED

RALEIGH—A letter from a Negro high school P-T-A in Rockingham may lead to the reinstatement of Dr. Frederick D. Quick also of Rockingham who lost his license to practice medicine following his conviction in Mecklenburg District Court of violating the Harrison Narcotics Act, the State Board of Medical Examiners indicated Monday.
"Our members are in sympathy with Dr. Quick," the Board president replied, "and his patients need for his service. Our action in no way closed the door to Dr. Quick's reinstatement of license."
"Information of the type you have given the Board is very helpful to us and to Dr. Quick."
PEOPLE SUFFERING
The P-T-A letter expressed full confidence in the physician who had attended to Rockingham medical needs and said that if he had violated rules and practices he had done so for the sole purpose of helping his fellowmen, and concluded:
