He further stated that it would appear that, lacking adult advice, boys and girls are forming their own moral codes based on the expediency of the moment. Adults face a grave and awful task. It can and must be fulfilled if civilization is to survive, if the American way of life is to be preserved.

Dr. M. D. Williams, Supervisor Wilson City Schools and vice-president of the group introduced the theme, D. H. Conley Superintendent Pitt County Schools was guest speaker. Mr. Conley was accompanied by the two supervisors for the white schools, Miss Annie L. Jones and Mrs. Edna Baker.

In his introduction Mrs. Baldwin stressed the need that the teacher know the child and the community if she would best serve the nation's forces which would improve the quality of living in the community. Among the Guides which he pointed up as being significant for the improvement of the quality of living were the curriculum should be the actual experiences of the child; teaching materials and procedures should be in keeping with the maturation level of the child; the health and physical development of the child must be seen as a significant factor in his behavior.
