

Shaw U. Bears End Year's Loop Play Beating Morgan

RALEIGH — With Sam Jones again leading the attack, Shaw University's Bears beat Morgan State College Bears 61-63. This was their 14th win against 9 losses. Jones led a first half attack as Shaw moved out front and held on.

Shaw led at the end of the first

period 17-11. This lead was stretched to 41-23 at the half way mark. Tom Lewis and Captain Al Wilson paced the second half scoring as Shaw romped on the Morgan Bears.

Each member of the Shaw guard had five scored in the double figures as Shaw hit on 61.1 per

cent of its floor shots and 63.2 per cent of its free throws. Shaw forced the ball the final three minutes of play.

Sam Jones made 22 points for Shaw, while Wilson made 16. Lewis 14, Tom Daniels 13 and Elmer Clark 11. Ernie Garrett and Lester Gardner made 17 each for Morgan while "Spider" Murphy added 11.

Shaw will meet the Elizabeth City Teachers College five in the opening round of the North Carolina College tournament at 8:30 p.m. on Friday, March 29th, after which the Bears will move on to the CIAA tournament in Baltimore on March 6, 7, 8.

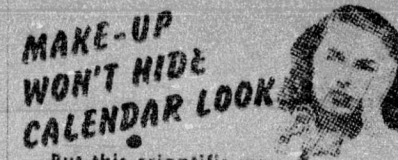

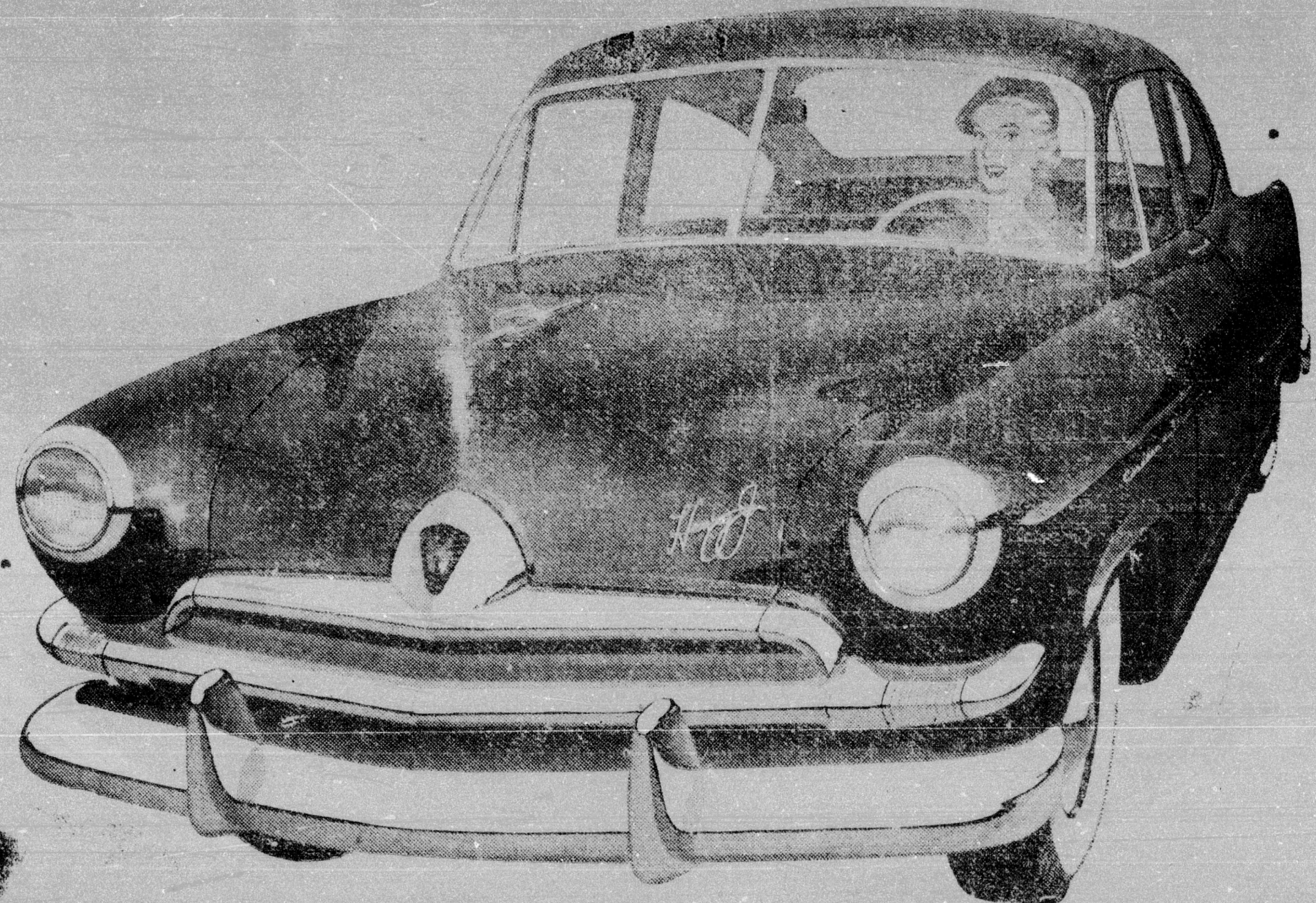
The bride is a graduate of Hampton Institute. She is presently employed in the Raleigh Public School System at the Crosby-Garfield School.

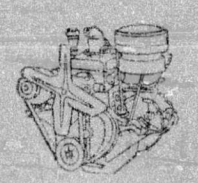
Friday evening Mr. and Mrs. Boswell entertained with a re-

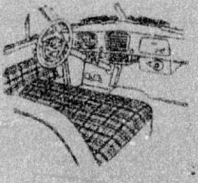

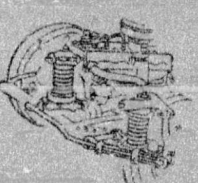
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
