OTHER DEATHS
Near Clinton a five-year-old child, Truman Beason, was killed instantly when struck by an automobile.

At Hooquemont, Nathaniel Ross, 28, was killed when the car he was driving skidded off the pavement and plowed into an embankment near his home.

Seymour Cummings of Greensboro, died as the result of knife wounds allegedly inflicted upon him by one Barbara Peet of Lenoir Point.

FREAK ACCIDENT
In a freak occurrence near Lenoir, John Albert Murray, 37, was instantly killed. Murray apparently slipped from the back of a truck tractor on which he had hitched a ride and fell under the wheels.

A Goldsboro man, Willie B. Lewis, was killed during the weekend when he was shot by Miss Hazel Yeverton. Lewis reportedly was advancing on the woman with a knife when he was shot.

Sam Johnson, 65, made a valiant but futile fight for life after he was struck by a car near New Bern. He died in a hospital some 48 hours later, however.

Christine Bullock, 14, stepdaughter of Jack Holiday, 48, 1000 Main Street, mother of Mrs. Perry, was left at the Walnut Street residence with the three small children, according to a second report while Mrs. Perry went shopping for groceries on Fayetteville st.

Miss Bullock's mother called her and she pulled the door open. She intended to enter and it was locked unintentionally.

The fire was first discovered by Miss Bertha Cooley, who lives in the 100 block of Branch Street. She first to reach the scene was Wade McClary of Lee Street who happened to be in the area at the time McClary broke open the front door and attempted to enter the house but was halted by a blaze.

Graveside rites were held for the victims at the Hillcrest Cemetery where interment was made on Monday afternoon.

building at the time. Fortunately this was an "off day" for the students as it was the break between quarters. Normally "hundreds" of students and instructors are in the

building.
The blast occurred around 1 p.m. while a number of the graduate students were out to lunch.

Firemen, using ladders, rescued three men and a woman trapped on the fifth floor of the building. Although firemen and rescue squad members used gas masks, still they were hampered in battling the blaze due to the intense heat and fumes from the chemicals.

Four firemen were overcome in the 40 - minute fight to quell flames which spread throughout the building.

Among those injured were Steven (Tony) Bland, 4, son of Mrs. Nellie Bland, Howard division, Robert H. Green, J. W. Anderson, and Eva Donaldson. They were all carried to Freedmen's hospital for treatment.

The chemical blast brought two fire trucks to the scene, one arriving about 1:30 p.m. and the other about seven minutes later. They rolled out 26 pieces of fire fighting equipment.

The firemen from the rescue squad reported that the two basement rooms in which the blasts occurred were demolished, but the damage was confined to that immediate area.

Fire Chief Millard Sutton reported that a large quantity of T. N. T. — enough to "blow up this side of town" — was stored in a room a few feet from the spot where the four men were killed. The door to this storeroom was blistered by the explosion.

The four dead men were burned almost beyond recognition. The cems which the janitors were moving were considered dangerous because they had been on hand since World War I.

Williams, the only surviving janitor, said the cans started "sizzling" while the men were carrying them out in bundles.

He evaded reported by saying, "If you realize how lucky I was you wouldn't ask me questions."

Dr. Mordereen W. Johnson, president of the university said that something unexplained happened. "All I know at this moment," he said, "is that the men, under the direction of the superintendent of the laboratory, were moving a large quantity of dangerous chemicals. They knew what precautions to take."
