## THIS WEEK IN Washington

**WITH PASSAGE** by the senate of the bill to give the oil-rich under sea lands to the adjacent states, despite two decisions of the United States supreme court that the federal government has paramount jurisdiction over these areas beyond the low tide mark, this congress has again put the matter up to President Truman. It will be remembered that the President vetoed such a measure in 1946 and he is expected to do so again.

The senate turned down any compromise on the matter, such as a split authority between the states and the federal government and turning the royalties into an educational fund for the public school system. Vote on the measure was 50 to 35. Certain exceptions were set up in the measure providing that states which had not already done so might extend their boundaries to the three-mile limit. In the case of the gulf coast of Florida and the coast of Texas, the boundaries were recognized as three Spanish leagues (10 miles) seaward. Title to the land further out on the continental shelf was not accorded by the measure.

The Senate has approved a bill to increase the base pay of all armed services personnel by three per cent and allowance by varying amounts and to provide a \$450-a-month combat pay for fighters in Korea. The bill was a complete revision of a house-passed measure which permitted a straight 10 per cent increase in all pay and allowances without addition to combat pay. Total cost of the senate version is expected to be \$471,000,000 annually, while the house bill was estimated to cost \$850,000,000. Senator Richard B. Russell, Georgia, chairman of the armed services committee said the senate measure was designed to meet the increased cost of living without changing the basic pay system fixed by congress in 1949.

The Senate also passed a bill increasing monthly rates of compensation and pensions to veterans and their dependents. The measure would provide a 15 per cent in-

crease in compensation for service-connected disability to veterans of all wars who are rated between 50 and 100 per cent disabled, and a five per cent increase for those rated between 10 and 49 per cent disabled. A house-passed bill did not include veterans of the Spanish-American, Civil and Indian wars. Another veterans increase measure was passed by the senate on voice vote, after already having passed the house, which would increase the annual income limitations governing payments of pensions to veterans with non-service-connected disabilities. The measure raises the income limitations from \$1,100 to \$1,200 for single persons and \$2,000 to \$2,500 for married persons.

After beating down all efforts to increase funds, the house passed the army civil functions appropriations measure just as it was recommended by the appropriations committee, carrying \$492,334,900 for fiscal year 1953. It gives the corps of engineers \$472,295,400, Panama Canal \$16,139,500 and the quartermaster corps \$4,000,000. The corps of engineers fund was broken down into \$221,232,400 for flood control projects and \$187,450,000 for rivers and harbors projects. The house even rejected, in the face of the disastrous Kansas-Missouri floods, funds to start the Tuttle creek reservoir in Kansas, recommended by President Truman in his Jan. 21 budget message.

The House agricultural committee recommended the agricultural department appropriations bill, totaling only three per cent from requests of the department for a total appropriation of \$124,000,000. The committee rejected recent innovations of the American farm bureau federation and the national grange and allowed most of the funds requested for soil conservation. The committee warned that the country would face a serious food shortage in 1953 if conservation activities were not strengthened. The farm bureau had recommended that the budget request for \$258,590,000 for conservation payments be cut to \$100,000,000 and the committee allowed \$250,000,000.

## Pvt. George Roberts Finishes GI Course

**RALEIGH** — Pvt. George C. Roberts has completed a nine-month course in electronics at Fort Bliss, Texas, and after a furlough home will be reassigned to Fort Lewis, Washington. Pvt. Roberts is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Sidney Roberts of Raleigh, a graduate of Washington High School in Raleigh and at the time of his induction was a Junior at A. and T. College in Greensboro.

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
