St. Augustine's Complete Plans For Commencement

RALEIGH — The final plans for the Commencement activities for the 55th Anniversary of the College, have been completed and released by Dr. Harold L. Trigg, President of Saint Augustine's College.

The activities will be initiated with the Senior Class Day Friday, May 23. The Will and Prophecy of the Class of '52 will be read in an outdoor exercise on the Campus. The Class Song, composed by members of the Class, will be introduced and rendered by the Class during the proceedings. The Class will present their gift to the College following the exercise.

Alumni Day will be Saturday, May 24. The program for the day will be under the direction of Mr. John D. Epps, Jr. of Washington, D. C., National President of the St. Augustine's Alumni Association.

The 55th Annual Baccalaureate Service will be held in the College Chapel on Sunday, May 25th at 5:00 p.m.

The Reverend Richard B. Martin, Rector of Grace Episcopal Parish, Norfolk, Va., will deliver the Baccalaureate address.

Also on Sunday from 8 to 10:00 p.m. in the President's home, Dr. and Mrs. Harold L. Trigg will entertain the graduates and their parents, along with the Alumni Faculty and Staff of the College, and special guests, at the President's Reception.

The Commencement Exercise will be held on Monday, May 26th at 10:30 a.m. in Taylor Hall on the College Campus.

Prior to the conferring of degrees by the President, the Commencement Address will be delivered by the Right Reverend Hamilton West, D.D., Bishop of the Diocese of North Carolina, and President of the Board of Trustees of the College.

As a part of the graduation exercises, the new Penick Hall of Science will be dedicated by the Right Reverend Thomas H. Wright, D.D., Bishop of the Diocese of East Carolina.

Dr. Edson E. Blackman, Physician of Charlotte, N. C., and an alumnus of St. Augustine's, will preside over the Flag Raising and Lowering ceremonies. The Lowering of the Class Flag will follow the Commencement Exercises. Dr. Blackman will present the Flag to the most outstanding student in the graduating class.

The Amphitheater of the Penick Hall of Science will be the site of the Commencement Exercises, which will follow the Flag Lowering ceremony.

Finals At A & T To Include Dedication Of 9 Buildings

GREENSBORO, N. C. — The 4th Annual Commencement program will include the dedication of nine buildings at the Agricultural and Mechanical College, which will be held on Saturday, May 24. The commencement exercises will be held at 10:30 a.m. in the College Chapel.

More than 100 candidates for graduation will receive degrees, certificates and diplomas at the formal commencement exercises, concluding on Monday afternoon, June 2. According to C. C. Cunningham, college registrar, students at the college will have qualified for 29 master of science degrees, 325 Bachelor of science degrees, 62 trade certificates and nearly 100 commissions as 2nd lieutenants in the United States Army.

Nine of the 15 new buildings completed in the current

million dollar program now underway at the college will be formally named and dedicated in conjunction with the commencement exercises. These include: Men's dormitory, girls' dormitory, Agricultural Extension Building, Technical Institute Building, Power Plant, President's Home, Chemistry Building, farm poultry plant and dairy farm plant.

The Honorable Robert H. Frazier, prominent attorney and Mayor of Greensboro, will deliver the commencement address. Mr. Frazier, former Vice Consul to Norway, chief counsel of the Export-Import Division of OPA during World War II and active head of many outstanding organizations, local and statewide, is a graduate of the University of North Carolina. He is also a member of the trustee board of the

college.


The Baccalaureate sermon will be delivered by Bishop W. Y. Bell of South Boston, Va., resident bishop of the Fourth Episcopal District of the Colored Episcopal Methodist Church. He is a graduate of Lane College, holds the A.M. and S.T.B. Degrees from Northwestern University and the Ph.D. Degree from Yale University where he was a Carrol Cutter Fellow. An instructor at several colleges, Mr. Bell assumed the bishopric in 1938. Before being appointed to his present position, he presided over the states of Florida and Georgia.

The four day program begins with class night of the senior classes on Friday, May 30 at 8:00

p.m. Dr. and Mrs. Bluford will act as hosts at a reception honoring members of the graduating classes, alumni and visitors on Saturday afternoon beginning at 6:30 at the president's home. The Baccalaureate service is scheduled for 11:00 a.m. on Sunday with the annual concert of the college choir to follow in the evening at 8:00 o'clock on the front campus lawn. The college band will present its annual outdoor concert, also on the front campus lawn beginning at 2:30 p.m. on Monday.

The formal outdoor commencement and the concluding program will be held in the College Quadrangle beginning Monday afternoon at 4:00 o'clock.

More than 150 students and advisors representing more than 20 schools attended the meeting.


