GREENSBORO — A 21-year-old Lenoir County man was being held in city jail early this week under \$10,000 bond after being charged with stealing two cars and wrecking both of them at the same spot within an hour's time.

Officers said Craft Morris stole one car from the Gateway Motor Company at 200-202 North Forth Street about 1 a.m. Saturday and then went back and took another when the wheel ran off the first. Police said the second car Morris stole was brand new with only four miles on the speedometer. He wrecked the second car on a light pole at Forth and Washington Streets, the same place he left the first one, police reported. Morris was caught after a state highway patrolman ran him down in a foot race.

Morris was originally charged on two counts of auto theft and one of burglary. The charges mounted when an additional charge of breaking and entering Eales and Trull Motor Company, 110 North Forth Street was lodged against Morris. — EPC
