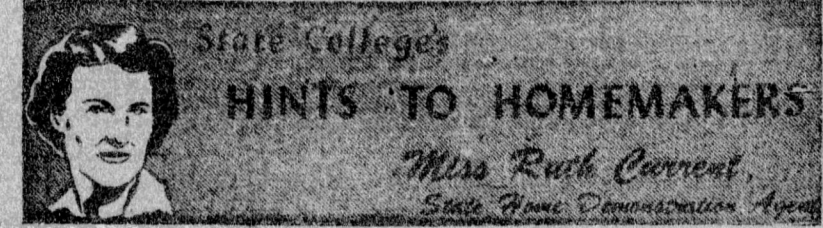

WIDE CHOICE IN THROW RUGS
 Throw rugs are available in cotton, rayon or the new Fibre E — in a myriad of colors, sizes and textures.

Fibre E is long wearing and can be smartly carved and textured into designs. Rugs made of Fibre E are soft resilient, and crush resistant. Dirt and lint are easily removed. Both the light and dark shades wash beautifully and dry fast.

Rayon has gone into rugs and the result is a soft tufted or textured rug with a beautiful sheen and long-wearing qualities. Colors are in a wide range and include a clear white and a rich black. These rugs shed dirt and foot-marks very well. They, too, go in and out of the washing machine with the greatest of ease.

Cotton rugs have in a few short years proved their worth time and again, not only in decorative schemes with their bright "decorative" colors but in practical use and washability. Most popular are the tufted rugs with cut or uncut pile of different lengths, some twisted some not — some combinations giving a textured or a sculptured effect. However, they are as easily laundered as the longer known clientele variety of cotton rugs or braided or hooked cotton rugs.

NON - SKID TREATMENT
 The Fibre E and rayon rugs as well as many of the cotton rugs come with a non-skid treatment on their backs that prevents skidding and keeps the rugs definite-

ly placed. This treatment lasts thru repeated washings. Another advantage of this non-skid treatment is that several small rugs may be placed together to make a larger or longer rug. They will not separate but will lay flat and close together to give the impression of one piece.

In other words, your new washable rug may be magic but they do not need to be. They are perfect for a household they add in safety as well as adding to comfort and usefulness.

Nurses To Meet In Atlantic City

NEW YORK — Ten thousand graduate nurses, Negro and white, are expected to attend the Seventeenth Biennial Convention of the three largest nursing organizations in the country at Convention Hall in Atlantic City from June 16 through June 20. It was announced this week by the Convention Committee, 2 Park Avenue.

Former members of the National Association of Colored Graduate Nurses, who disbanded their organization in the summer of 1949 to complete integration of Negro nurses into the American Nurses' Association, will be represented as full-fledged members of the ANA. Mrs. Estelle Massey Osborne of New York City is a member of the board of directors.

Among the topics to be discussed are integration of Negro nurses into full professional status, wages, working hours and conditions, psychiatric nursing service, and creation of new occupational sections within the organization.

The convention will probably be the last joint session held by the American Nurses' Association, the National League of Nursing Education, and the National Organization for Public Health Nursing, which comprise approximately 200,000 members. Delegates will vote on a proposed reorganization into two associations — an expanded American Nurses' Association and a new National League for Nursing.

WATT'S NEW

IT'S REALLY WARM NOW and one of the most refreshing foods on the market, aside from being on the Plentiful Foods list for June, is oranges.

Ideal for salads, chilled fruit cups or desserts, or as appetizing garnishes.

THEN, TOO, there isn't anything so good as a glass of chilled fresh orange juice, for breakfast or for a cool pick-me-up later in the day.

Aside from being so full of Vitamin C, oranges contain a generous supply of pectin, which when eaten whole are converted into pectin in the digestive tract and are a valuable aid to digestion, particularly in regulation.

SOME SUGGESTIONS FOR JUNE MENUS:

Salad bowl of orange sections on slices and crisp greens with French dressing made with orange juice. For a salad plate a ring of orange slices around a mound of cottage cheese or berries, fringed with lettuce or other salad greens. First course for company meals — an orange peel cup loaded with sliced oranges, bananas and strawberries. Orange gelatin dessert with orange segments in the mold or as a garnish.

FOR THE LUNCH PAIL prepare a whole orange for easy eating by cutting just through the peel in quarters, loosening the quartered peel enough to separate the orange sections inside, then folding back the peel, and wrapping the orange closely in waxed paper to hold it together.

GARDEN TIME

It is now time to plant collards, Brussel sprouts, and tomato seed for the fall crop. These should be ready to transplant to the garden rows by July 15 to August 1. In Florida, the Improved Grolier Globe variety is being recommended as a fall tomato because it does not crack as badly as the Marglobe. These two varieties are only moderately wilt resistant. The Jefferson and Southland varieties are highly resistant to fusarium wilt. If you prefer a yellow tomato, the New Sunray variety is good and is resistant to wilt.

If the hot weather has ruined your early greens, there is still time to plant some New Zealand spinach which is a warm season crop. The seed should be soaked in water for a day or two before planting. This vegetable is not related to spinach and I have noticed that the students in my vegetable gardening classes who have taken some home for trial usually come back for more. I find that most of the boys in these classes have never eaten Swiss chard, New Zealand spinach, kohlrabi, eggplant, sprouting broccoli, cauliflower and Chinese cabbage, or Brussel sprouts. This means possibly that these crops were not grown in the gardens back home. I would say that this is an indication that our planting plans need some revision before next year.

Chinese cabbage, green sprouting broccoli, kohlrabi, and Brussel sprouts are best grown as fall crops. Brussel sprouts seed should be sown by July 1 and the plants transplanted as soon as they are large enough. Chinese cabbage, kohlrabi, and broccoli seed, may be sown in late July or early August and thinned out or trans-

FARM QUERIES

QUESTION: What is a good poison to use against the tobacco hornworm and budworm?

ANSWER: Tests conducted at State College and at the Oxford tobacco branch station indicate that DDE is a very effective poison for both hornworms and budworms. A 10 per cent dust should be used at the rate of 15 to 30 pounds per acre during late season when the pests are often numerous and when the plants are large. If a 5 per cent dust is used, the rate should be 30 to 60 pounds per acre. For early season applications when the first worms are seen and the plants are small, slightly smaller amounts of either 10 per cent or 5 per cent dust may be used.

QUESTION: Where can I get information concerning the cotton insect situation?

ANSWER: Starting on June 6, the State College Extension Service will issue weekly reports on the cotton insect situation. The information will be made available to county agents and other agricultural leaders as well as to press and radio.

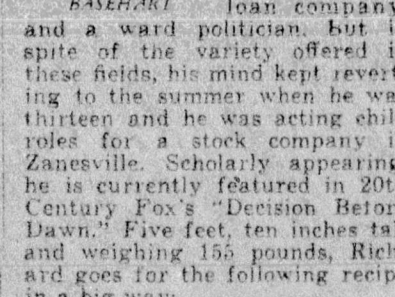

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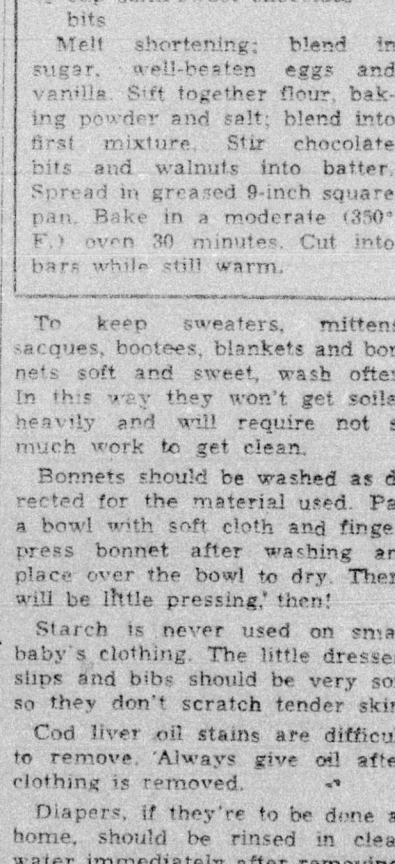
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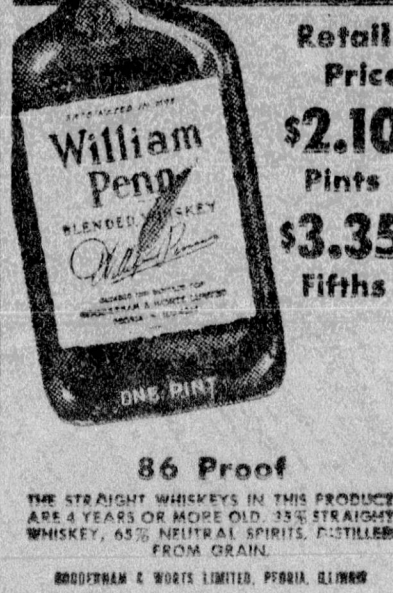
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
