The evening was spent in chatting and reminiscing of the past school days.

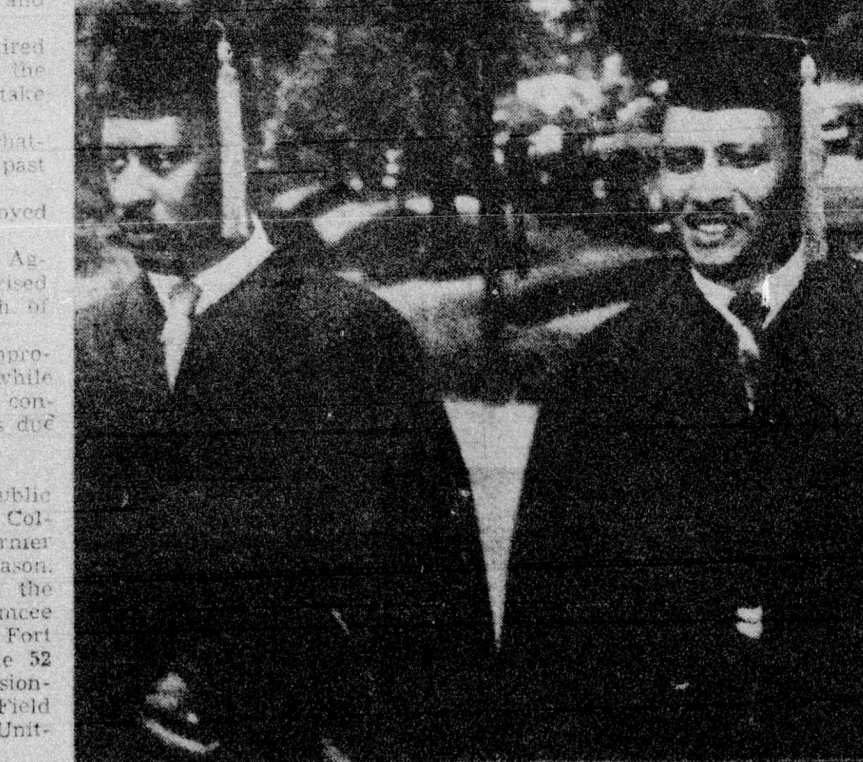
Mrs. Rosebud Aggrey enjoyed the evening with her mother.
