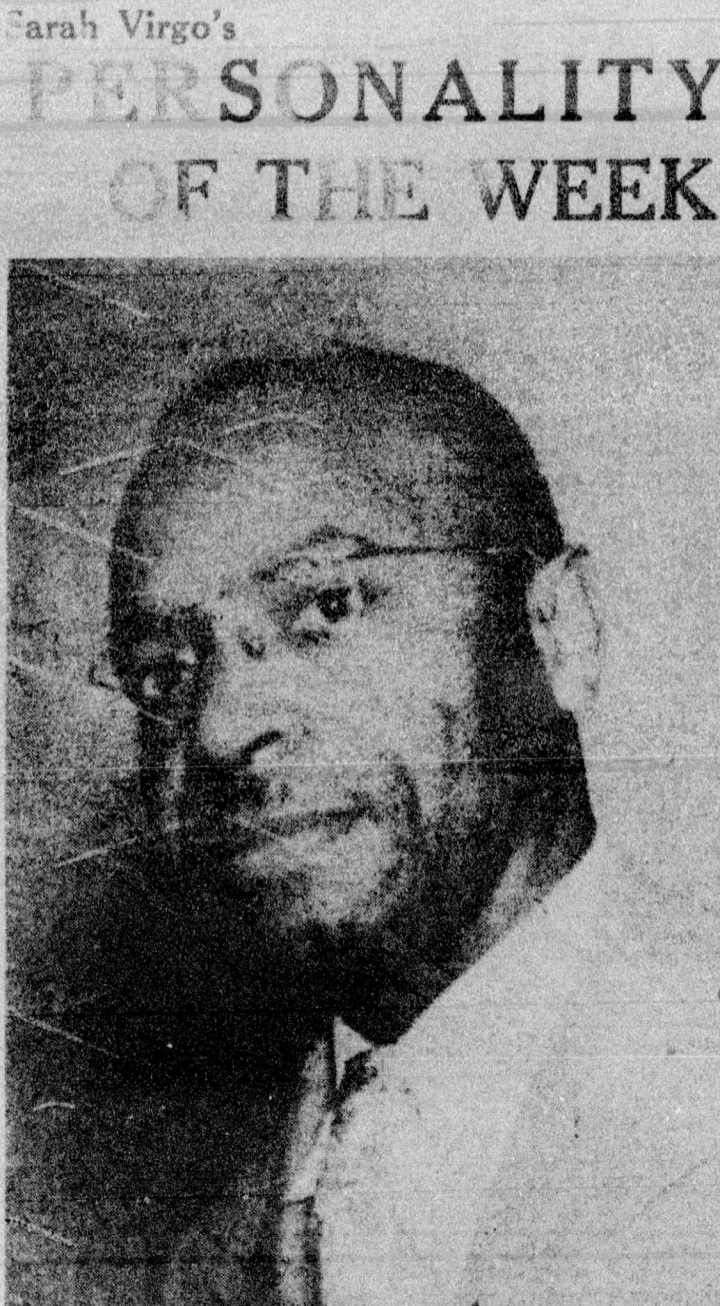

RALEIGH -- The Raleigh Life Underwriters Association has taken the responsibility of encouraging Wake County citizens to give blood to the Armed Forces Blood Donor Program when the Red Cross Bloodmobile comes to Raleigh June 16, 17, and 18, at Edenton St. Methodist Church.

Tom Cain, Recruitment Chairman, announced that more than 100 Raleigh Life Underwriters had pledged to obtain five donors each during the Bloodmobile visit.

The Committee of managers who will act for their District offices is made up of Arch Ames, Frank Wilson, Cliff Gibson, George Ragsdale, Feld Towler, T. E. Williamson and Cleo Hooks.

Dr. William J. Senter, Chairman of the Red Cross Blood Donor Program stated, "Wake County

has been asked for 600 pints of blood during this Bloodmobile visit. This is an average of 200 pints a day. Without the students at State College and the girls colleges and coming as it does two months after its previous visit, Wake County MUST put forth a special effort to meet its quota."

The Bloodmobile set-up at the Edenton Street Church has been raised as one of the best in the State. The program will open on Monday and Tuesday, June 16 and 17 between 12 noon and 6 p.m. and on Wednesday June 18, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

"No matter what happens and no matter where it happens," Dr. Senter remarked, "we must have enough blood and plasma on hand to care for our wounded. More blood means fewer white crosses and our servicemen know that is true. They are counting on Wake County civilians to give blood now. We cannot let them down." BFC
