Carolina-Born Crooner Leaves Johnson To Solo

TOLEDO, O. (ANP) — After eight years as featured vocalist with the Buddy Johnson band Arthur Prysock became a soloist last week following the band's appearance at New York's Apollo theater.

The 27-year-old N. C. native (Greensboro) crooner made his debut her in Toledo and will follow this band with engagements in St. Louis and elsewhere before he makes his Broadway bow in September. However, Prysock has not severed his connections with Johnson although the maestro will act as the vocalist's manager.

Livingstone College Grad Is Made Judge In Africa

ACCRA, GOLD COAST (ANP) — Charles Sterling Accolate, one of the leading magistrates of Gold Coast, has been elevated to the Judicial Bench. He becomes the sixth African to be appointed a judge in Gold Coast.

Appointed a magistrate in 1943 he has served in that capacity at several posts, Swedru, Kumasi and Koforidua. He acted as Pulse Judge for the first time last year when Sir James Coussey, one of the most distinguished of African judges, went on leave.

Judge Accolate was born in the Gold Coast, but went to the United States when he was 12. Sponsored by missionaries of the African Methodist Episcopal Zion church, he entered the primary grades which existed then at Livingstone College, Salisbury, N. C. He remained in America for ten years. After graduation with

a B. A. degree, he returned home for three months and then proceeded to England where he entered Fitzwilliam Hall, Cambridge University and was graduated in 1931. He began his law studies the same year.

Young Won Many Votes But Lost Race In Norfolk

NORFOLK, Va. (ANP) — The unexpected heavy voting among white people as a result of the controversial daylight saving time issue is believed by some political observers to be the reason for the defeat of Thomas W. Young, only Negro candidate in the race for City Council here June 10. Young polled 5,436 in a total of 13,069 votes cast.

Young was one of five candidates in the race for four seats on the city council. As an independent candidate, he ran in opposition to the administration ticket which had the endorsement of the Democratic party machine.

Though some had predicted that Young would not win the support of Negro voters, he not only polled a heavy vote in the mixed

and predominantly Negro precincts, but led in eight of the 37 precincts. He received some votes in every precinct in the city.

GREENSBORO, N. C. — Alexander Corbett, Jr., director of veterans' education at A. and T. College passed early Wednesday morning of last week at the L. Richardson Memorial Hospital after a brief illness.

A graduate of the college in the class of 1937, Corbett had been employed at A. and T. since that time with the exception of a temporary interruption between 1941 and 1947. During this period he worked with the National Youth Administration in Elizabeth City from 1941-1942 and with the Naval Ammunition Depot in Portsmouth, Virginia through December 1946. The deceased returned to the college as assistant to the bursar in January 1947. He was promoted to the position of director of veterans' education in 1949, a post which he had held since then.

A native of Waccamaw Lake, Corbett is survived by his wife, the former Miss Frances Wallace of Beech Street, Greensboro, one son, Alexander III, his father and mother, four brothers and a sister.

Funeral services were conducted from the Church of the Redeemer at East Market Streets Saturday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock with the Reverend John J. Greene officiating, assisted by Rev. Cleon M. McCoy.

The School and Conference was highlighted by the appearance of the Rt. Rev. Bravid W. Harris, Bishop of Liberia, in a keynote capacity.

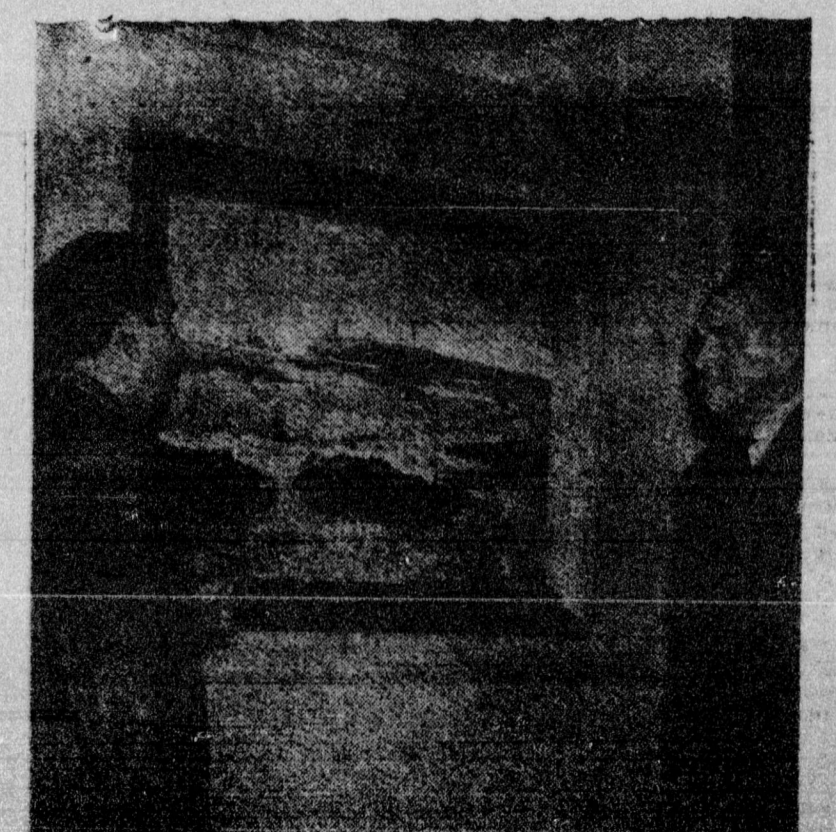
