

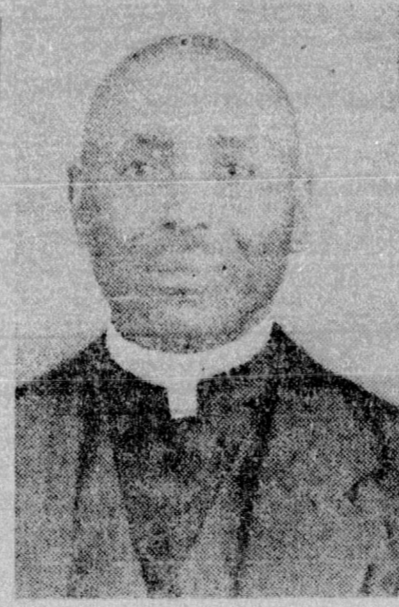

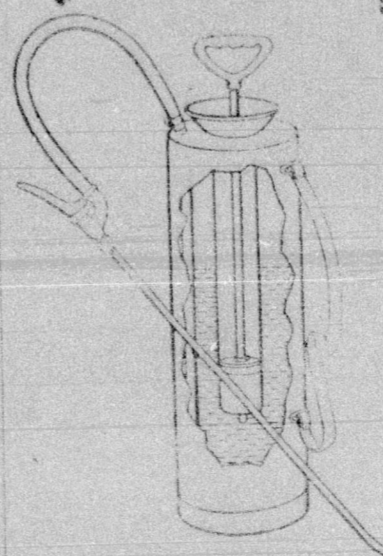

CHICAGO — When grandfather, as a boy, had to pick potato bugs from the vines he longed for an easier way of combating these pests. According to the National Sprayer & Duster Association, the only model of what we now know as the compressed air or garden sprayer provided the answer in effectively applying Paris green. More and more families are finding new summer enjoyment in their backyard recreational areas after occasional sprayings of porches and border and foundation plantings with mosquito- and fly-killing insecticides. The sprayer has also out-reached the back-breaking job of digging dandelions and other lawn weeds by hand.

Useful for such off-season jobs as removing wallpaper and water base paints and applying single stains and other preservatives, this modern sprayer is indeed one of the most useful tools around the home.

RACE LACKS FACILITIES

WILMINGTON — Wilmington's Negro citizens who make up about one-third of the total population of the city are suffering through the near-100-degree weather here with no place to go in bathing.

The race's lone bathing spot in municipally owned Greenfield Lake was taken, and no substitute appears in immediate prospect. City Manager J. R. Benson told a group of Negro citizens some time ago that the city had yet to find a "suitable bathing spot." White citizens bath on the front of the lake on the Third Street side.

However, Benson stressed the idea that Negro citizens were welcome and invited to use the kiddie train, visit the zoo, and stroll receive all such complaints and through the park. When this writer reminded him that Negroes had been insulted on occasions when they sought to enjoy the city's park, he quickly replied that this was not the policy of the city government and that he would handle them with dispatch.

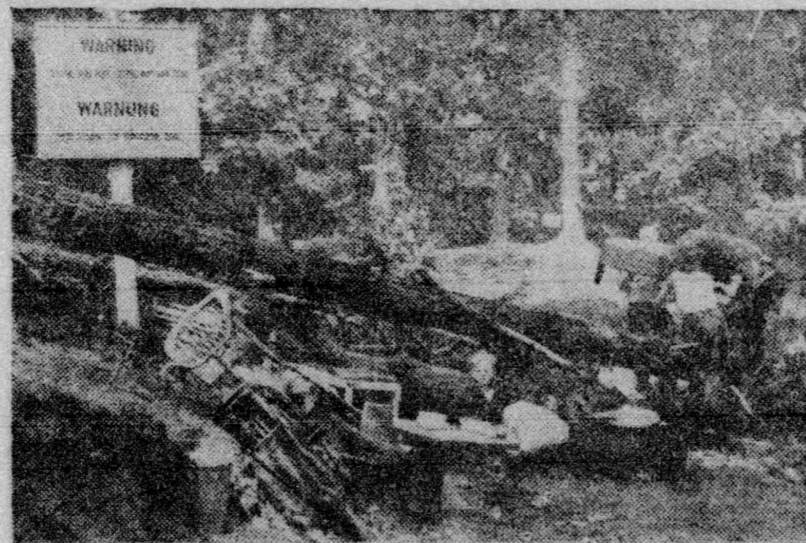

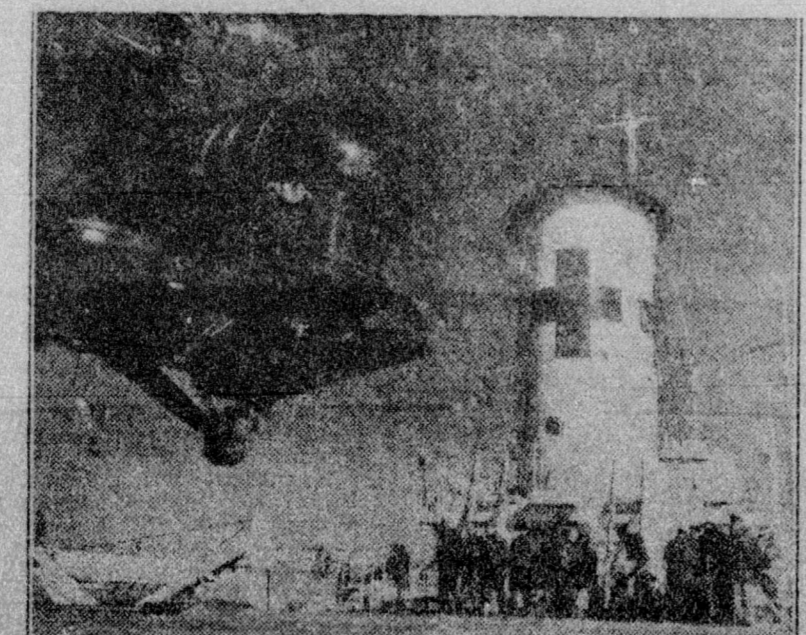

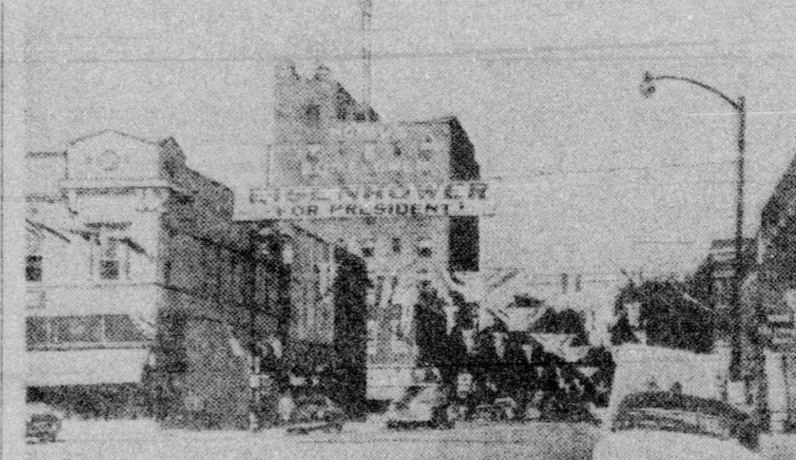
