BIG CATCHES OF BIG GAME FISH

MANTEO, N. C. — Big catches of big game fish have been made on the coast of Dare County this season. Through the past week a total of three white marlin had been landed. Since the 1952 Gulf Stream fishing season began one white marlin has been landed.

Two record breaking game fishes, a 97 pound cobia and a 55 1/2 pound channel bass have been taken. During mid-June a Danville, Virginia angler caught a 61 pound wahoo, largest of this species ever taken along the Outer Banks and small game fishing is also good with large catches of blues, trout and other varieties being made daily.
