RALEIGH — Miss Lucille Griswold, a member of the First Baptist Church here was among the 183 persons from 12 states attending the Leadership Training School at Maryville College campus, Maryville, Tennessee June 30-July 11. Among them were Sunday school teachers, superintendents, officers; women's organization leaders; choir directors; leaders, young people, adults; directors of Christian education; pastors.

At this school and at others like it across the United States, between 3 and 4 thousand volunteer church leaders study each summer. Courses are also offered for professionally trained leaders.

The school at Maryville conducted a children's laboratory section where teachers of nursery, kindergarten, primary, and junior classes got an opportunity to watch a skilled teacher, do some practice teaching themselves and finally join in the evaluation period which followed. The children were from the Sunday schools of the New Providence Presbyterian Church — where the school is held, the Second Presbyterian Church and the Maryville Methodist Church. Miss Elizabeth McCott, Christian Education Field Director from Nashville, Tennessee directed the school.

Of special interest was the choir school, under the direction of W. Lawrence Curry, S. M. W., of Beeson College, Jenkintown, Pa., for church organists, pianists, vocalists, and choir directors.

For an hour each morning the entire school at Maryville studied the Gospel according to Luke under the direction of Rev. J. Carter Swaim, Ph.D., Professor of New Testament Literature and Exegesis at Western Theological Seminary, Pittsburgh, Pa.

Courses were: Administration of Christian Education in the Local Church, Audio-Visual Education, Women's Work, The Social Witness of the Church, Missionary Education, Understanding Children, Youth, Living in the Christian Home, Young Adults, Pastoral Counseling, Teaching the Bible to Children, Christian Doctrine for Church Workers, The Preacher and His Message.

Rev. T. Raymond Allston, D.D., Associate Dicto of Leadership Education, Board of Christian Education, was Dean of the School. Rev. R. Dale LeCount, D.D., pastor of the Sixth Avenue Presbyterian Church, Birmingham, Ala.

W. Vesper Loader, Recreation Director, H. R. Pinkney, Board of Christian Education, were under the leadership of Rev. (Continued on page 7)

Star Of Film Playing At Ambassador Followed Advise to Make the Grade

RALEIGH — William Marshall, noted Broadway star, playing a featured role in "Lydia Bailey," a Twentieth Century-Fox Technicolor production of adventure in Haiti beginning at the Ambassador Theatre here Sunday has come a long way from his birthplace of Gary, Indiana where he labored in its steel mills.

Upon graduating from high school, on death his parents' old-fashioned virtues of "hard work and study" in order to get ahead firmly placed in his mind, he set out to become an actor.

Unable to find any work he drifted into the theatre, starting as a chorus singer.

Just as he was beginning to doubt his future as an actor, Marshall was paged for a role in the noted play, "Green Pastures," playing the part of the "Lord." It was this vehicle that brought quick fame to the giant six-foot-five actor who was then rushed to Hollywood where he was paged for his current role in "Lydia Bailey."
