

# Durham YWCA Launches \$94,000 Building Project

## Harriet Tubman Branch YW Planning Additions

DURHAM — Ground-breaking ceremonies were staged here last Wednesday morning as construction got underway on additions costing over \$94,000 at the Harriet Tubman Branch YWCA.

The additions to and alterations on the YW building here undertaken here and at a cost of over \$194,000. Included is a new wing for the Central YW. To be included in the project at the Harriet Tubman branch is the completion of a basement to house heating and recreational facilities. The first floor of the building will be utilized in offices and rest rooms while the third floor will offer rooms to 18 young women.

Participating in the ground-breaking exercises were Marvin M. Fowler, co-chairman of the building drive recently completed here; Mrs. H. Shelton Smith, president of the Durham YWCA; R. N. Harris, co-chairman of the drive and Mrs. Albert Manley, branch chairman, who conducted the exercises.

The dedicatory prayer was offered by the Rev. James A. Cannon.

She made her home in Durham with her son and his wife at their residence, 1811 Fayetteville St.

Mrs. Johnson was a native of Cherry, S. C. She left her home town and moved with her family to Rockingham around 1904. The family later moved to Hamlet. Prior to associating with White Rock Church in Durham, Mrs. Johnson had been active in the First Baptist Church of Hamlet.
