

# Lawdy Miss Clawdy Creator And Band Raleigh-Bound

RALEIGH — Lawdy Miss Clawdy is coming to town. At least the man who created the sellingest "lady" ever to ride the phonograph records is Raleigh-bound.

Promoters this week revealed that the sensational Lloyd Price, creator of "Miss Clawdy" and his makes-ya-want-to-dance orchestra will appear at the Raleigh Memorial Auditorium on Monday August 4th in his first appearance in North Carolina.

The story of Lloyd Price is the story of a man and a tune coming out of the depths of despair to reach the highest rung in drawing appeal and in record-popularity polls.

Lloyd Price had been playing the tune "Lawdy Miss Clawdy" since he organized his crack crew a few years ago but neither Price nor the tune soared into the top realm of popularity until early this year when a recording firm began to send the "Lawdy Miss Clawdy" disc to disc jockeys all over the nation and to hand the

platter out gratis to record machine owners, and other promoters.

When "Lawdy Miss Clawdy" was first tossed into the public's lap in this manner, sales began to soar and Lloyd Price began to gain the recognition due him.

The appearance of the Lawdy Miss Clawdy group here is being staged by popular demand. A poll of 1500 dance fans in the Raleigh area revealed the Price group to be the most popular band as far as dancers are concerned.

Of the 1500 dancers polled, over 1250 definitely favored Price over any other group.

Other tunes for which Price has become famed include "Hot Everywhere" and the thought-provoking "Mail-man Blues."

## NCC FULBRIGHT FELLOW GETS HIGH HONORS

DURHAM — Benjamin F. Hudson, professor of French at North Carolina College, who has recently completed one year's study in France on a Fulbright Fellowship, received two certificates from the University of Paris last week.

Hudson, who makes his home in Nashville, Tenn., is a graduate of Fisk University and the University of Michigan. He is a candidate for his doctorate in French at Michigan.

According to word received this week by President A. Elder of NCC, Hudson received one certificate from L'Ecole Supérieure de Preparations et Perfectionnement des Professeurs de Francais a l'Etranger on July 7 and on the same day he also received the certificate with honorable mention of L'Institute Phonétique.

The young American professor was one of a limited number of Negro recipients of Fulbright awards during the past academic year.

Hudson, a veteran of World War II, saw service in Europe during the Third Army's invasion in 1942. He was attached to an infantry regiment.

The youthful professor joined NCC's staff in 1948. He has recently completed a study, under the auspices of the Carnegie Foundation, of "A Study of the French Program in Negro High Schools in North Carolina."
