



**WILLIE "THE TRAIN" IRVIN**—The nation's top pass receiver from his end post in '51 took five paydirt heaves from Quarterback Alkin Hepburn, the team's ace flinger, and another from sub Elwin Dean. The St. Augustine, Fla., senior is also a demon on defense and looms as one of the best flankers for '52 in intercollegiate football.

**ROBERT WILCOX** — OF THE ENDS THAT WILL MAKE THE Florida A and M College a power in this position. The Jacksonville lad has never played a college game before hometown fans but is expected to be in the thick of things when the Rattlers clash with the Texas College Steers there on September 29. Wilcox is terrific either on defense or offense.

**ALIN "MR. COOL" HEPBURN** IS PROBABLY IN A CLASS TO HIMSELF ON THE EVE OF THE 1952 football season. The Miami senior threw 11 touchdown passes for the Florida A and M College Rattlers in '51 — five against North Carolina College in the Orange Blossom classic. He has an excellent target in "Train" Irvin who took five of his TD heaves last year.

**JONES PHOTO.** — WILL HE PROVE TO BE THE SOLUTION OF THE LEFT HALF POST AT FAMCEE? — Robert Munzen, a senior from Jacksonville is expected to be given a chance at the left half spot on the Florida A and M College football team this season. He's rated by many as the most versatile player on the squad having been a regular end in '50, regular quarterback in '51 as well as a defensive standout. And it is believed that he'll come through in this position, a position that the Rattlers have been strong in down through the years.

**ADAM JOHNSON, THE RUGGED JACKSONVILLE END** will have his first opportunity to play before hometown fans on September 29 when the Rattlers of Florida A and M College meet the Texas College Steers in the Gator Bowl. Johnson was a defensive standout for the Orange and Green in '51.

**WILL HE REPEAT** IS A question many folk are pondering about William Kenchon, senior linebacker of the Florida A and M College Rattlers from Miami. The FAMCEE senior was a demon against passes during the '51 season, intercepting at least one in each contest. He earned All-American recognition.

**JCEN SANDS** — This rugged Miami junior was the number one offensive center for the Florida A and M College Rattlers in '51 and is a cinch to continue in this role for the '52 season. He's a potential All-American.

**FASTEST BACK IN NATION?** — That's what some folk say about James Moore, the fleet-footed fullback for the Florida A and M College Rattlers. The Coconut Grove, Fla., senior tallied 51 points for the Orange and Green last season and was cracked in a 1945 100 yarding spring track season.

**STATE COLLEGE ANSWERS**  
TIMELY FARM QUESTIONS

**QUESTION:** Who said August and September are months of rest in the garden?  
**ANSWER:** The man who didn't have a garden," according to John H. Harris, State College extension horticultural specialist.

"August and September are good months for planting beets, kale

mustard, spinach, leaf lettuce, turnips, carrots and radishes. If you have plants or can buy them, now is the time to set out collard, broccoli, and cauliflower and cabbage plants for a fall crop. Harris says.

The specialist also offers instructions on making a frame for protecting vegetables this winter.

Plant the hardy vegetables mentioned above in a bed about six feet wide and as long as you like. Place boards or logs about 18 inches high around the sides. Then place strips across the top to support a covering of burlap or similar material.

This covering is not usually needed except when the temperature drops below 20 degrees.

Don't allow the sun to strike the vegetables while they are frozen, Harris warns. Transplant your cabbage and collards to the frame when cold weather comes. Plants for transplanting next spring.

The frame is also a good place to seed and carry over head lettuce
