(Continued from page 1) present she could supply fifty persons with jobs. R. L. Holloman, President of the Layman's League, made a stirring appeal to the delegation on Tuesday night, to seek out men who were interested in the cause of missions. Mr. Holloman declared that there are not enough Laymen in the Protestant Church who are concerned by the perpetuation of the Christian religion in the world today.

PILGRIMS REPORT

A highlight of the Convention was the report of the recent pilgrimage to Liberia, by 22 persons, headed by the organization's Chief Administrator, Dr. Wendell C. Somerville in a Paul discussion conducted by Attorney Washington from the District of Columbia, a personal revelation of work now carried on in Africa was made to the assembled delegation. All persons reporting urged the Convention to continue on in its work of missions in Liberia.

A budget of \$30,143 was adopted for Liberia work. Other contributions for work in Liberia adopted by the Convention include a development of fifteen unit lighting plant to cost \$3,000, the purchase of 1500 books for the school library, \$1500. Purchase of equipment for Science Laboratory \$1500. Equipment for Domestic Science Building \$1500 and the purchase of one of seven buildings at a cost of 16,000 dollars to be paid in three years.

Under the supervision of Mrs. C. E. Griffin, Norfolk, Va., the Young People's Department reports having had the best session in the history of the Convention. Several foreign speakers appeared on the program with Rev. Abner Nelson, a high caste Hindu who was converted to Christianity, electrifying his hearers. Mr. Velson who has two brothers in this country studying, plans to return to his country this year as a missionary to introduce to others the idea of Christianity.

Dr. George W. Hartley, white founder and director of the Gambia Mission in Liberia, whose effective work there so impressed the 1951 Lt. Carey Pilgrimage to Liberia, that an invitation was extended to address the Convention here, appeared on the program and made an appeal for funds and help for mission work in Liberia. Other foreign speakers included, Prof. Sabariah Koedrieland Mathe of Fort Hare College, South Africa; Henry W. Lane, visiting Prof. of World-Christianity, Union Theological Seminary, New York, who spoke on racial conditions in Africa; the Rev. Larnie Lee Swann of Nanking, China; Philip Chang, a refugee from Communist China; Mantaz Nelson of India; Elsie Patrick of Bermuda; Janice Robinson of Jamaica, B. W. I. and the Rev. David Thomas, of Africa.

Only his limited experience will keep him on the bench, too, he has three good years before him. Miller passes well and can pitch. His specialty is the "C". An excellent runner, he might be explosive but he will be permitted to run more than the others. He, too, kicks and passes well.

The fourth best prospect for the vacant quarterback position is sophomore Lonnie Hall of Winston-Salem, N. C. The lightest and probably the fastest of the group, Hall, too, has no socially. He calls the dials from any of the varied formations.

If all four of these men could be poured into one another confident Jackson, a little bigger, a better passer, a better kicker, and probably a better field general would emerge to raise a few more gray hairs on the heads of opposing coaches.
