## UNC Law School Grads Pass Bar

CHAPEL HILL, N. C. (AP)—The end of a long struggle to practice their chosen profession came to an end recently for two Negro graduates of the University of North Carolina when they passed the state bar examination.

Harvey E. Beech, Kinston, N. C., and J. Kenneth Lee, Greensboro, two of five youths who made history when they became the first Negroes to enroll in the law school at the University, now are full-fledged members of the legal profession.

Beech got his degree at the June commencement and Lee completed his work in July. Another of the five students, James Robert Walker, Statesville, finished the law course too late to take this year's law examination. The remaining two did unsatisfactory work and

thus were unable to graduate.

Beech, a 28-year-old graduate of Morehouse College, probably will practice law in Kinston where his father is a prominent business man. Before going to the UNC, Beech studied for two years in the law school at the North Carolina college at Durham.

His wife is a graduate of the Atlantic School of Social Work and is a case worker in Durham where they live. Lee is a living recently discharged Navy veteran of World War II. Lee said he will practice law in Greensboro or Winston-Salem. He formerly studied at North Carolina A. and T. college, Greensboro, the University of Hawaii, and the Navy's Pacific University. At that time, his interest centered on radio and electrical engineering.

## Is Admitted To Bar

GREENSBORO—John Kenneth Lee, one of the two first Negroes to enroll at the University of North Carolina, was admitted to the bar for legal practice here Monday.

Lee and Harvey Beech, Kinston, enrolled at the University in June of 1951. The pair completed their law courses last July, the first Negro law graduates from the University.

**Men Missing, So Bears To Hibernate**  
No Scholarships Means No Football Team

RALEIGH—in a daily-warded official release the administration of Shaw University revealed early this week that the famed Baptist institution here will not field a football team for the current season.

The University publicity department's release further revealed that the "cancellation of the fall schedule was only a temporary expedient for this season and did not in any way indicate that Shaw was abandoning football as a phase of its athletic program."

According to Athletic Director James E. Lytle, an insufficient number of athletes had reported for preliminary football practice which began in September 1st. In addition, Mr. Lytle noted, injuries sustained by some of the men who did report for initial drills at the institution further put the institution "behind the right ball" as far as fielding a football team was concerned.

**QUESTIONS ARISE AS TO WHY ATHLETES WERE NOT PRESENT**

Even though the Shaw athletic committee voted unanimously to suspend football because of the inavailability of players, the question has arisen as to why the men needed to form a team were not present.

The principal reason given is that the University no longer offers athletic scholarships on the basis of athletic prowess alone. Shaw officials contend that if an athlete is to be given a scholarship, he must first have merited it scholastically.

The falacy in this principle is noted by that men who merit scholarships from a scholastic point of view have little provocation for participation in athletics. In the same manner, the athlete who is awarded a straight athletic scholarship feels himself duty-bound to participate in athletics to the best of his ability since it is obvious that he is trading his ability for the education that the institution offers.

**A TOUCHY DECISION**

The decision made by Shaw's administration to cancel athletic scholarships was made only after a valiant, yet futile fight was staged by Shaw's Head Coach H. K. (Brutus) Wilson and Athletic Director Lytle for re-consideration. Both Coach Wilson and Mr. Lytle contended, and rightfully, that if the University were to hold its own in the intense and sometimes frantic effort to secure the services of the Raleigh Citizens Association is to be held at the Bloodworth Street Y.M.C.A. on Thursday evening, September 22 at which time Dr. C. **GAMBLING TAX AND WHISKEY ARRESTS MADE**

RALEIGH—A rash of arrests made out 82 Negroes in the coils of the law in three North Carolina cities on charges of gambling and dealing with illicit whiskey.

Charlotte was the site of the arrest of 72 persons on whiskey charges while five other persons were nabbed on similar charges at Oxford.

At the Winston-Salem, the law cracked down on persons known to be participating in butter and eggs lottery operations.

Arrested at Winston-Salem on charges of failing to buy \$50 gambling tax stamps were: James Clayton LeGrand, 48, of 2633 Harrison Avenue; Robert McCollough, 35, of 202 South Woodland Avenue; Willie M. Morrison, 61, of 1116 East Seventh Street; Homer F. Owens, 54, of 373 East Eighth Street; Edward Walker King, 28, of 708 East Ninth Street; and Embler Cooper, 56, of 1443 East Seventh Street.

The six men all previously arrested on lottery charges, were brought before Commissioner Charles E. Anderson Tuesday to make bond.

All of the men except Cooper posted bond of \$500 each and were released. Cooper was committed to the federal jail at Greensboro.

Commissioner Ader ordered the men to report for trial at Middle District Court in Winston-Salem.

## GATE CITY COPS SUED IN DEATH OF PRISONER

GREENSBORO—The death of a Negro in city prison here in June brought a suit for damages totaling \$75,000 against two city police officers Tuesday.

Albert O. Smith, 109 East St., as administrator of the estate of William (Billy) F. Smith, 32, who died June 23, charges City Jailer Sam L. Maness and Police Chief Jeter L. Williamson with "gross negligence."

In his official report, the coroner, Dr. W. W. Harvey, said that the death probably could have been prevented. At that time, Chief Williamson said "everything that was humanly possible was done." The chief also said jail officials then said Smith ate his meals that day and had not appeared.

The complaint filed in Guilford Superior Court, asks for following relief from the defendants, including National Surety Corporation as bonding company for the officers: \$45,000 actual damages; \$20,000 punitive damages; from Maness.
