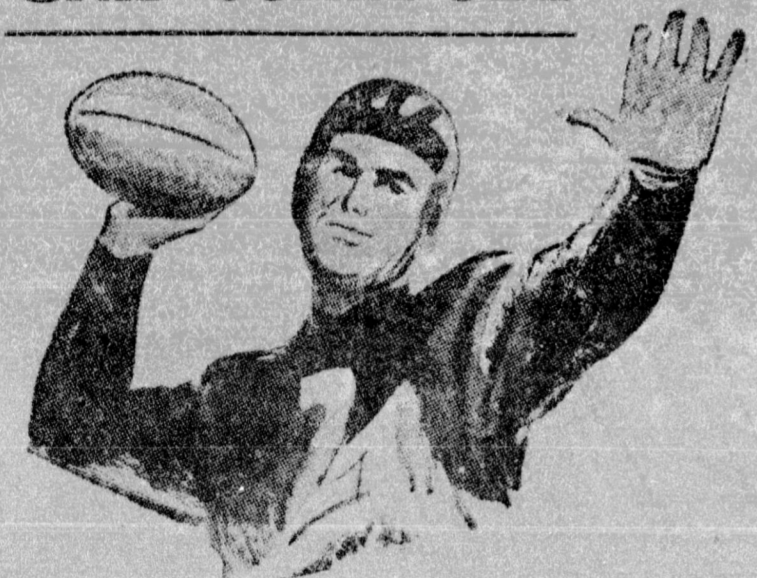


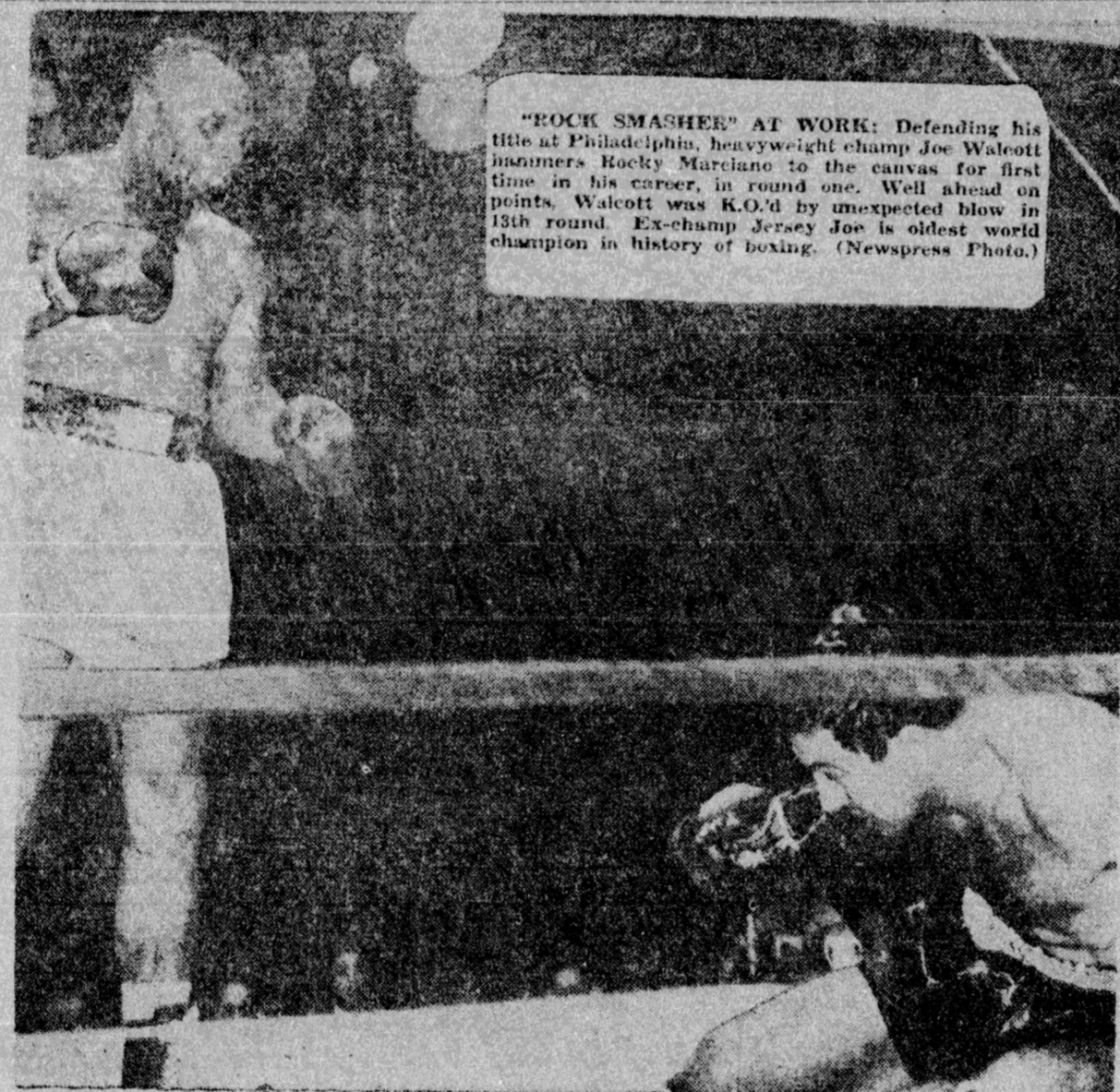

## FROM THE RINGSIDE

From a champion title, it is customary to write eulogies in his memory and to his great victories of the past. Not so many days ago, a heavy-weight champion fell by the wayside a victim of the rigors of age and the onslaught of youth.

In losing his crown, Jersey Joe Walcott, also lost his greatest victory. He gained the first time in his career the admiration of the boxing fans as a fighting man. The thousands of fans who saw him valiantly stand up and slug with his mighty foe Rocky Marciano, until the inevitable end came in the 13th round, thrilled at his magnificent exhibition.

His display of boxing finesse and defensive artistry amazed and delighted the fans. Throughout this fight, they were thinking to themselves, "Can he last? How long can he go on at this pace?"

Unfortunately, he did not and could not last. He ran into a mighty Marciano right at the beginning of the 13th round, and it lights out. In earlier rounds he had deftly sidestepped the blow that crushed his hopes of retaining his title.

When Rocky landed that one, one seemed to flow into Jersey's first (Continued on page 2)

## Aerial Attack From Scat Slot Sets Up 2nd Victory

GREENSBORO, N. C. — The Aggies let loose with a surprising aerial attack to crush the 211 men University Yellowjackets 33-7 in a one-sided game here last Saturday night at the Greensboro Stadium. Bill Bell introduced another of his surprises in quarterback Charles Tidale who operated principally from the "Y" and single-wing, who all but passed the South Carolinians out of the stadium to account for the second win for the Aggies in a 21 game start for the current campaign.

Barely 3 minutes after A-T Stadium had kicked off to Allen the Aggies had drawn first blood. The South Carolinians were forced to kick to the Aggies 5 yard line. Otha Miller passed 26 yards to James Smith, fleetly Aggie halfback, who ran an additional 15 yards to the Allen 25. George Johnson ripped off 13 yards to the Allen 17 and James Smith took a handoff and covered the remaining distance for the initial play. The extra point by Donald Quarles went astray.

The Allen Yellowjackets made a period threat in the first quarter on a pass interception by Chris Covert on the Aggie 25 yard line and with two first downs in rapid order returned to the Aggie 15. Here the drive was stopped cold by a stiffed Aggie forward wall.

Bill Bell inserted Charles Tidale as quarterback, his single wing specialist who sprayed the Allen secondary with bullet-like passes in the second quarter. Bill

"Sticky Fingers" Bush was his first target. He gathered in a 30 yard heave on the Allen 40 and cut the distance and a few minutes later, Tidale shot a 30 yard toss to him from the Aggie 45. He scampered across the goal line untouched. Jack Gibson converted by placement after the touchdown. The score at the end of the half was 20-0.

Tidale, with the Aggies in possession on the South Carolinians' 35, moved back to pass, could locate no open receiver with the middle defense open, elected to run. He waded the distance. Jack Gibson's run for extra point was wide of the posts.

The one and only Allen touchdown came from a pass interception by Chris Covert, the score he made in the evening. He pulled in on the A- and T 46 yard line, twisted away from a couple of tacklers and covered the remaining distance. He also kicked the extra point.

The fifth Aggie touchdown was set up by a Tidale to Lavender Payne, a freshman halfback from Winston-Salem, good for 48 yards to the Allen 5 yard line. Spencer Gwynn of Redville, crashed thru from one yard stripe for the score. Gibson converted from placement in the early moments of the 4th quarter.

With just seconds to go, Bennie Mann let loose a 40 yard pass to Greene for Allen, who carried to the Aggie 5 yard line. The one and only play failed to carry across as the game ended with a 33-7 victory for the Aggies, their second in a row for the current season.

Bell emptied his during the second half, but among those turning outstanding performances for the Aggies included the two Smith brothers, James and J. D., of Greenville, S. C., and Tidale on offense while Bill Boyers and Larry Singletary, Roosevelt Gilliam and Chris Covert were among the standouts for Allen.

The 120-piece A and T Marching Band gave a special demonstration with miniature lights in the darkened stadium which drew warm applause from the small gathering of some 4,000 spectators.

## Game Set December 6th

GREENSBORO, N. C. — The A and T Aggies will definitely take on the strong Maryland State College eleven on December 6 here in Greensboro Stadium. Bill Bell, director of athletics at A and T College made this announcement this week shortly after receipt of signed contracts from the Maryland institution.

The game had been listed only as "tentative" on the schedules of the two institutions for the past two months, awaiting final agreement on particulars.

Bell revealed that the event, the final encounter for the Aggies on their 10-game card, will carry a "classic" atmosphere to close out a grid schedule which will bring sports fans in this section to see some of the better teams in the country.

Both institutions are expected to field good teams for the current season. Maryland State took its initial contest, a victory over Virginia Union and on the following day, the Aggies whipped Central State.

## "Home Boys" Will Show In '52 National Classic

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Nine boys who prpped at the Washington (D.C.) public schools, are slated to see service when Virginia State meets North Carolina College here at Griffith Stadium, October 18th in the Sixth Annual Central Intercollegiate Athletic Association National Classic.

In addition to the players, it will be homecoming for Virginia State coach Sylvester (Sam) Hall who started here at Howard University before going on to gain acclaim as mentor of Cardozo (D.C.) High's football and nationally-famous track teams.

Two members of the North Carolina squad and seven who will wear the orange and black of Virginia State are District representatives. Both of the Carolinians are among their team's leading ground - gamblers and products of Dunbar High. They are halfback Billy Coward and fullback Mel Spenser. Both boys are seniors and should be hitting their peaks this season.

Five former Cardozo stars lead the array of local lads from the Ettrick (Va.) school. They are quarterback Leo Miles, halfback Steve Ellerbee, tackle Ed Allen, and guards Ben Waddell and Ross Williams.

Miles and Ellerbee were All-Conference choices last year and will be going all-out in 1952 to maintain this honor.

The other local lads on the Virginia squad are sophomore center Earl Richards, who played for Armstrong, and Jim Grant, a 125-pound tackle from Dunbar.

## SC STATE UPSET VICTOR OVER FAYETTEVILLE

FAYETTEVILLE, N. C. — After letting off to a sluggish start Head Coach Lawrence Simmons' vaunted "Ball Dogs" by way of inaugurating an all-Carolina pigskin tilt, rallied to score in the second and third quarters to down a victory-minded Bronco outfit by a score of 14-0. After the opening kickoff, the game quickly settled down to a battle of defensive lines with the "Old Game" Broncos getting the better of the deal and rolling up a first-half total of several first downs to the visitor's three. Following a first-quarter stalemate, marked by numerous penalties, the Orange and White-clad "Ball Dogs" came to life late in the second quarter, took the ball on the thirty and with Parks and Martin alternating carried it to six yard stripe and a Fayetteville penalty promptly advanced it to the one. From here Martin lug-nosed a snoutoff man road it, no sign was good. DURHAM, N. C. — North Carolina College's gridiron powerhouse defeated St. Augustine's College of Raleigh, 19-0 in a CIAA opener here at Durham Athletic Park last Saturday night.

Herman Riddicks charges, apparently playing under wraps and juggling a limited number of the tricky plays said to be in their bag of 1952 hocus-pocus, revealed that their old standby, Melvin "The Mighty" Spencer may be mightier than ever.

The 26 year old senior fullback from Washington, D. C., repeatedly ripped through the valiant Falcons' line, running behind some of the most effective blocking and screening seen at NCC in many years. Spencer, a strapping 6-footer, scored all three of the Eagles' touchdowns, standing up, a splendid tribute to the early season accomplishments of Coaches Jim Younge and Ben Whaley.

Although the Eagles mauled the Falcons all over Durham Athletic Park, the Falcons were a scrappy bunch of players who gave good accounts of themselves, offensively and defensively. The Falcons accounted for 9 of the night's 19 first downs. What they lacked, however, was firepower, and the Eagles apparently have that in abundance this season. Only Spencer's scoring plays were used, a well informed source said at NCC early this week.

The game itself figures as one of the most important for the two teams. The extreme rivalry which has marked their meeting on the gridiron over the past quarter century is enough to assure an interesting contest. Both teams, of high pre-season ratings and have been selected by sports writers to figure prominently in the hotly contested CIAA flag battle. The Aggies are slightly favored in this first conference engagement of the season as a result of the showing made in the two non-conference encounters with Central State College and Allen University.

Bill Bell, Aggie mentor, announced early this week that he is going to use both of his "T" quarterback specialists, the Miller and Lonie Hall, who performed excellently this season.

William H. Gamble, dean of men at A and T College and chairman of the High School Senior Day planning committee announced this week that the celebration for this year will be the largest that the college has ever had and may turn out to be the largest single gathering that the institution has ever received. "Judging by the responses we have received and the number of late acceptances to invitations sent out two weeks ago, we are bound to exceed our first year's total of some 4,100 high school seniors," he told reporters this week. —BFC

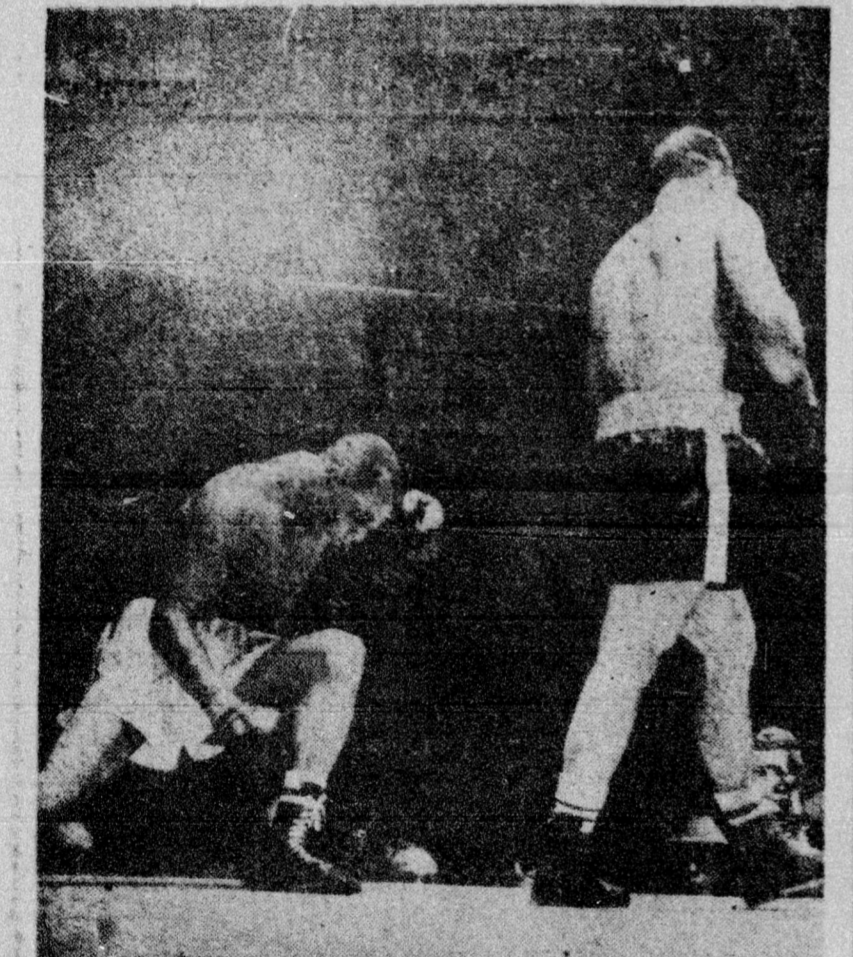
