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General Hospital Bid Nixed



HOSPITAL PLAN DOWN BUT NOT ENTIRELY OUT

Governing Group Says General Plan Was Not Formally Presented

RALEIGH — The decision made this week by the Wake County commissioners to proceed with plans calling for a new tax sponsored hospital at St. Agnes, should not be taken as the last word on the subject.

The proponents of the Rex and St. Agnes expansion idea spared no money or effort in getting before the commissioners a dazzling array of propaganda to support their contention that the citizens of Wake County should be taxed to pay for and support private hospitals here. Detailed plans were presented to the commissioners and an array of local speaking talent was brought forward to befuddle the issue. At no hearing did the commissioners ask for an opinion from the local doctors, however, a request for a county general hospital was voiced at one meeting by several physicians.

The commissioners asked for and received an appraisal of the situation from the Duke Medical Foundation. In a verbal statement, presented the commissioners by one of its hospital experts, the Foundation gave its full support to the general hospital idea and presented basic facts to back up its reasoning.

It is true, that the supporters of the general hospital plan, have not presented the commissioners a detailed, concrete outline of its... (Continued on page 8)

CONGRESSMAN DAWSON AT N. C. COLELGE; BLASTS GOP PROGRAM

DURHAM (Special) — The Republican Party's Presidential and vice-presidential candidates, particularly and in general, received a verbal "roasting" from Congressman William Dawson of Illinois, one of the two Negroes in the US Congress, as the Democratic National Committee man appeared on a forum presentation at NC College here Tuesday.

As opening presentation on the college's fall forum series during which political aspects are to be aired for the benefit of NC College students and the college community, Congressman Dawson delivered a scorching pro-Democrat speech in which he pointed out what he considered short coming of the opposition party.

Dawson, a wounded veteran of World War I lashed out at the Republicans from the time of that War through the present presidential campaign. He charged that the "arts of the administrations of Presidents Warren, G. Harding, Calvin Coolidge, and Herbert Hoover killed the League of Nations, removed restraints and controls from our economy, left American military weak, paved the way for unprecedented unemployment and laid the foundations for World War II."

Killed Girl-friend, Draws Term

WINSTON-SALEM — A man who killed his girl friend in the servants' quarters of a home in which she worked was sentenced in Forsyth Superior Court Monday to 25-30 years on the road.

Sentenced was Herman H. Bostic, alias Boston, 33-year-old Winston-Salem resident. The judge offered the defendant a short lecture on the folly of "going with" another man's wife.

Bostic, a bakery worker, at first denied to police last month that he killed Mrs. Rosa Ingram.

But dried blood eaked on his feet provided officers with the evidence they were seeking. Bostic finally broke down and admitted the killing.

Bostic pleaded guilty to second degree murder. He did not take the stand.

The story of the killing was related in court by officers, who said Bostic told them he and the woman got into an argument over the fact that she was pregnant by him and that her husband, serving on a road gang, would kill her when he found out about it.

Bostic told officers that the woman advanced on him with a paring knife and that he grabbed a pistol and shot her.

Bostic had been convicted numerous times since 1940 on charges of assault on a woman, assault with a deadly weapon and carrying a concealed weapon.

Man Hit With Rock Dies; One Held

HENDERSON — A blow from a rock proved fatal last week end for Herbert Royster Jr. and Allen Vaughan, 33, is in jail awaiting a hearing next week as a result.

Royster was struck in the back of the head by the rock, and was taken to Jubilee Hospital, where he died in mid-morning Sunday.

Vaughan admitted hurling the rock. The incident occurred at a roadhouse about two miles north of town on the Townsville road Saturday night.

Raleigh Man Found Dead In Bed

RALEIGH — A 53-year-old man, Basil Jenkins, was found dead in bed Monday morning at his residence, 15 W. Worth St. City detectives reported that he died of natural causes.

Detectives investigating a complaint at the address, found Jenkins dead in bed. He was found sprawled half on the bed and half on the floor and there were no signs of marks or bruises on him to indicate he had been hurt, officers reported. The man's sister, Mrs. Mattie Wall found her brother dead when she went to wake him for work early Monday.

Mrs. Wall said her brother often had fits during the night, which usually awoke her.

Officers reported Jenkins had epileptic fits "most any time".

Presidency Of Palmer Inst. Changes Hands In Impressive Ceremonies

SEDLIA — "Impressive" is the word to describe the event taking place here last Sunday as the nation's leading educators of both races paid tribute to a slightly built woman who with courage founded an institution, guided its destiny for 20 years through two World Wars and a Great Depression, then placed responsibility of its management in the hands of another woman of distinctive ability.

Such was the occasion when Dr. Charlotte Hawkins Brown, founder of Palmer Memorial Institute here passed the presidency of the institution over to Miss Wilhelmina Crosson in the presence of a notable group of educational leaders, college presidents and their representatives.

When Auditorium on the campus of the nationally-reputed institution was site of inaugural ceremonies during which Dr. Howard Johnson, president of Howard University, was the principal speaker.

Cheering masses were paid Dr. Brown not only by the principal speaker, but also by many of the other dignitaries on hand to see the institution gain its second president since its founding by the veteran woman educator in 1903.

WOMAN SHOOTS HUSBY THOUGHT TO BE BURGLAR

Fuquay Springs Woman Must Stand Trial In "Mix-Up" Kill

FUQUAY SPRINGS — A middle-aged local housewife who told police officers that she shot through a door at what she thought was a burglar and killed her husband, must face trial in Wake County Superior Court at Raleigh on a manslaughter charge, a magistrate has ruled upon finding probable cause for a manslaughter indictment in the case.

Mrs. Martha Wooten 47, admitted that she fired a shotgun blast through the rear door of her local residence Saturday night after someone she mistook for a burglar continued pounding on the door. The blast struck her husband, Geo., in the leg, severing an artery and causing the victim to bleed to death.

Magistrate M. A. Bland, sitting at Raleigh Tuesday, ordered the woman put under a \$1000 bond pending trial on a manslaughter charge. Magistrate Bland's investigation revealed that though Mrs. Wooten and her husband lived together in the same house, there existed between them a situation of estrangement in that the man had failed to support the woman's needs for several years.

At the time of the fatal shooting, it was learned during Tuesday's hearing, Mrs. Wooten was in the process of making preparations to leave Fuquay Springs to take up residence in New York.

The trial is expected to appear on the docket for the next session of the Wake Superior Court.
