## Raleigh Ministers Mark Advent Of Newest Bible

RALEIGH, N. C. (ANP) — White and Negro churches in this city held joint services here Tuesday night, Sept. 30, in observance of the publication of the revised Standard Version of the Bible.

The main speaker was Dr. Robert T. Dabick, professor of Old Testament interpretation at Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, Wake Forest, N. C. The local union services was sponsored by the Raleigh Ministerial association and it was held in Meredith college auditorium.

The day of the observance marked the 500th anniversary of the printing of the first book — the Gutenberg Bible. Similar services were held in all parts of the country.

Dr. E. McNeil Poter, pastor of Follen Memorial Baptist church, gave the historical background of the new Bible, and Beatrice Donley of Meredith college led the combined choir composed of members of several city church choirs.

Dr. Harold L. Trigg, president of St. Augustine's College, Dr. W. R. Strasser, president of Shaw University, and Mrs. Gurney P. Hood participated in the program. The Rev. Ed. Agston, pastor of West Raleigh Presbyterian Church, presided.

## OFFICIAL HEARD AT RALEIGH MEET

RALEIGH — A representative of the Central Negro Health Council reported on recent developments in Negro Rural Health in Buncombe County as part of the "Progress Parade" at the 5th Annual Rural Health Conference in Raleigh on Wednesday, October 15.

The representatives were one of six participants at the beginning of the afternoon session which was designed to indicate what was going on in North Carolina Counties.

The Rural Health Conference sponsored each year by the Central Negro Health Council of the Medical Society of North Carolina and the North Carolina Health Council. Feature speakers at the all day conference were Allan B. King, President of the American Farm Bureau Federation of Chicago, Illinois, and Aubrey O. Gates, of Little Rock, Arkansas, Field Director, Council on Rural Health of the American Medical Association.

The Buncombe County Negro Rural Health story was chosen as one of the most outstanding in the state as an example of local health activities. Among other local health activities, the Central Negro Health Council representative reported on their activity during the past summer with household surveys and chest x-ray program.

Later in the afternoon the Rural Health Conference was divided into two eight discussion groups, the topics for which the major standard indicated as their major local health problems. The objective of this year's conference was to report and hear from as many rural health workers as possible in an effort to decide what are the most effective ways of solving rural health problems.

## CIVIC CLUB IS ORGANIZED AT RALEIGH SCHOOL

RALEIGH — The Saint Monica's Civics Club of Saint Monica's School has received its official charter from the Commission on American Citizenship in Washington, D. C.

At a recent meeting members of the 7th and 8th grades voted to organize their own unit of the Civics Clubs.

Saint Monica's Civics Club is one of the more than 1,300 Catholic Civics Clubs chartered in the United States in the past year. Sponsored by the Commission on American Citizenship of the Catholic University of America in Washington, D. C., these Clubs foster training for good citizenship in the upper elementary grades, throughout the nation. Through monthly projects, featured in the YOUNG CATHOLIC MESSENGER, these young citizens learn in a concrete way the meaning of Christian social living based on principles of justice and charity.

This year the Commission on American Citizenship has set up for the Clubs a program of study and action under the general theme, "Know Your Neighborhood, Help Your Neighbor." Individual projects will deal with helping newcomers in the community, safety, conservation, the problem of surplus population in some areas, the U. S. immigration policies. During October Civics Club members will conduct an intensive "get-out-the-vote" campaign.

## ASKED TO HIRE HANDICAPPED

RALEIGH — Lee J. Craven, local employment office manager of Raleigh, has urged employers to re-examine their personnel hiring policies and take any steps which may be necessary to assure that physically handicapped workers are considered and employed along with other workers on the basis of their ability to perform the job.

Mr. Craven said the productive capacity of physically handicapped workers, when properly placed, had been demonstrated both during and since World War II.

The experience of large numbers of employers has demonstrated that the key to the productive capacity of the handicapped is adequate preparation and placement on jobs suited to their physical abilities and skills. Most jobs can be filled efficiently and safely by persons with some type or degree of physical impairment.

Mr. Craven said the cooperation of employers in making fullest use of handicapped workers will serve the dual purpose of increasing the productive capacity of the labor force and affording handicapped workers opportunities to contribute more fully to the national defense and the maintenance of a vigorous economy.

"The Raleigh State Employment Service local office has trained selective placement personnel who will be glad to assist employers in getting qualified handicapped workers to fill their job openings," the manager said. — BFC
