Shaw, St. Augustines' Students Told Role Of Railway In Daily Life

RALEIGH — "Everything we eat or wear is carried on a railroad during some phase of its develop-

ment," declared Dr. Thomas Sinclair, prominent railroad industry spokesman, in an address at Shaw University last week.

It is disturbing. When we consider the white office holders, from Presidents of the United States down to dog catchers, who have miserably failed in their offices, it is nothing short of an insult, for the white man to even mention that one Negro has not come up to their expectations.

Speaking at a special joint convocation of Shaw University and St. Augustine's College faculty members and students held under the auspices of the Association of American Railroads, Dr. Sinclair described the effects on our every-day lives of rail movement.

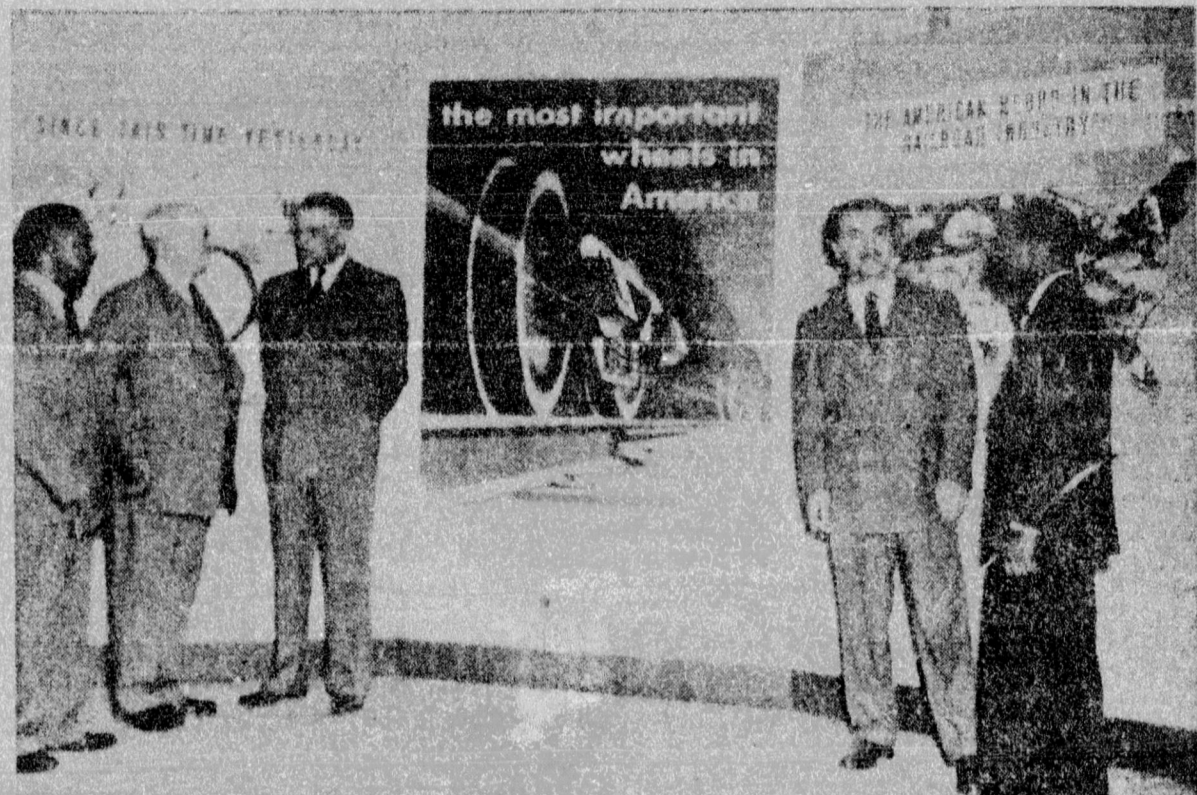
The rail executive, who is Manager of the School and College Service of the AAR, traced the development of the industry from its beginning in 1825 to the present day, emphasizing the extent to which that advancement was dependent upon the progress of the Nation.

Using simple charts to illustrate his lecture, Dr. Sinclair described how the railroads were responsible for the introduction of standard time in the United States, and how the interchange of freight cars throughout the more than 140 systems in the country is made possible.

The lecture was the third in a series being held under the auspices of the Association of American Railroads on campuses of Negro colleges and universities to acquaint students with the significance of railroads to our industrial economy.

The speaker was introduced by Dean Foster Payne, dean of the college at Shaw University. The presiding officer at the convocation was Rev. Moses N. Delaney, Chairman of the Committee on Church and Religious Life.

Seated on the platform were Dr. William Shivers, President of Shaw University; Dr. Harold L. Trier, President of St. Augustine's College; and Col. Robert S. Henry, Vice President in charge of Public Relations of the Association of American Railroads.
