ATLANTA (AP) — There will be a football game between Morris Brown College and Tennessee State College Saturday at the Municipal Stadium in Nashville.

This is one of the big games of the year in the Gate City and these two teams are expected to have a full house to the stadium.

PIRATES TO PLAY MORGAN STATE HOMECOMING

BALTIMORE — Plans for a full weekend of homecoming festivities were being whittled into shape this week at Morgan State College, ready for a gala homecoming day Nov. 15.

Main attraction on the homecoming fare is the Nov. 15 football game between the Morgan State College Bears and the Hampton Institute Pirates at E. M. Hughes Stadium.

But full plans are being detailed for a variety of activities beginning Friday, Nov. 14 with a campus bonfire and ending Sunday, Nov. 16 with worship services at the Morgan Christian Center.

Details for the homecoming activities, which are to be announced later this week, are being planned by an over-all committee of fourteen headed by Mrs. Frances B. Hill and Dr. Earl Jackson, faculty members.

Joe Black, star pitcher of the National League pennant-winning Brooklyn Dodgers and a Morgan alumnus, is tentatively scheduled for the guest of honor at the annual Varsity Club meeting, Nov. 14. In one of the highlights of the three-day celebration.

Additional highlights tentatively arranged include: the entertainment of "Queens" from each high school in the State of Maryland and of the former "Miss Morgans" on Nov. 15; tea by each of the fraternal groups on the same day; a luncheon and a band and parade on Nov. 16; and a homecoming ball at the Hampton Institute.

Joe Black To Be Honored At Morgan State College

BALTIMORE — Joseph (Joe) Black, baseball's 1952 "bookie of the year" and three Olympic champions will be honored for "exceptional athletic achievement" by their Alma Mater, Morgan State College, at a special assembly program in the Hill Gymnasium Friday, Nov. 14 at 10 a. m.

The citation assembly will officially kick-off the 1952 Morgan homecoming program, which features the Morgan Bears football team in a contest with their rivals, The Hampton Institute Pirates at 2 p. m. Nov. 15 in Hughes Stadium.

Sharing the citation spotlight with the National League pennant winning Brooklyn Dodgers pitcher will be Vincent George Rhoden, present Olympic 400 meters champion record holder; Beron Truman LaBeach, winner of several 100 meter dashes in past Olympic European meets last summer in Helsinki; and Arthur George Brazg, former National AAU and NCAA sprint champion.

Both Black and Rhoden are Morgan alumni while Brazg and LaBeach are juniors at the college.

Dr. Martin D. Jenkins, President, will present the citations establishing a precedent for awards of this kind. Dr. Thomas P. Frazier, chairman of the Ath-

letic Committee, which is sponsoring the program will preside. Commendations will be extended to the athletes additionally by Dr. Carl Murphy, a member of the Morgan Board of Trustees; Morgan Coach Edward P. Hurt and Tallmadge L. Hill, Jr., Dr. Eugene D. Bird, president of the Morgan Alumni Association, and Louis Randall, president of the Student Council.

Black, a native of Plainfield, N. J., and a 1930 graduate of Morgan, jumped from the obscurity of an unknown rookie into national prominence almost overnight last season with the Dodgers, turning in a magnificent record in relief.

At Morgan Black, who won the 1952 World Series opener for the Brooklyn "Bums" was a member of the championship football, basketball and track teams.

A native of Jamaica, the British West Indies, and a 1932 Morgan alumnus, Rhoden gained international fame as a member of the American Olympic Team. He won the world record breaking 1600 meters Jamaica Olympic Relay Team. He was a member of Morgan's championship relay teams and NCAA 400 meters champion while at Morgan.

LaBeach, like Rhoden, is a native of Jamaica and was a member of the Jamaican Olympic Team. He is a member of the Morgan State College championship sprint relay team.

Only Baltimorean in the group is Brazg, who is the grandson of the late Father George Brazg, rector of St. James Episcopal Church, former National AAU and NCAA sprint champion. Brazg won the 100 meter dash in the 1932 Olympic trials as a member of the American Olympic Team.

Edward N. Wilson, Morgan registrar and Athletic Committee member, is in charge of the assembly program. Assisting him in addition to Dr. Frazier and Coach Hurt are Dr. George H. Spaulding, Dr. C. B. Campbell and Augustus Mosely, student member.



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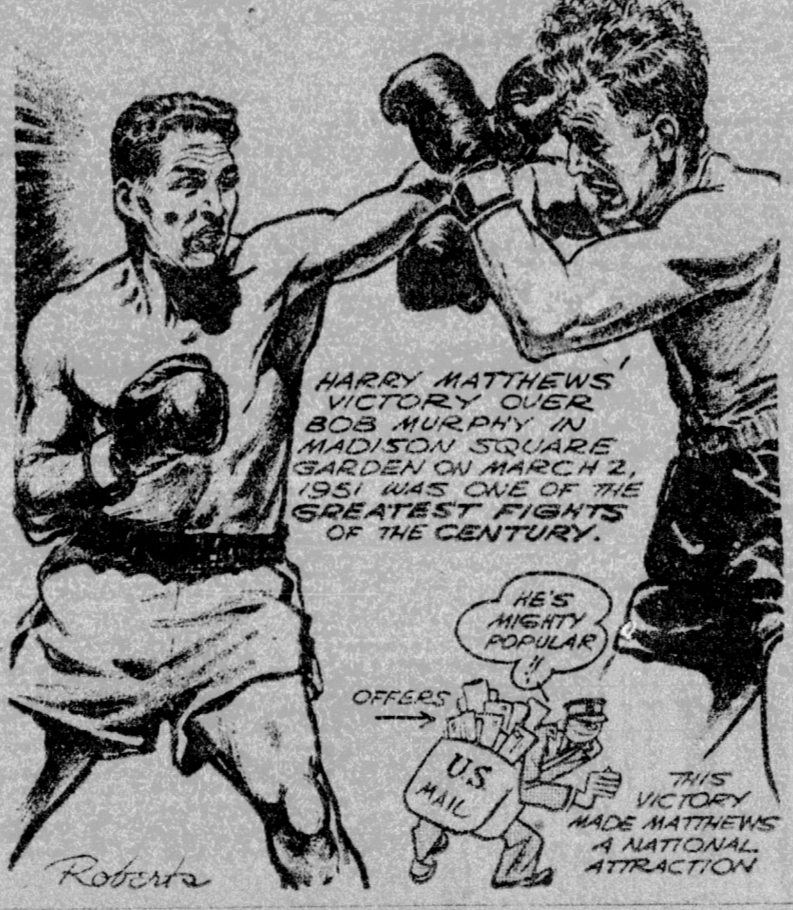

No one has campaigned any harder than I have for Archie Moore and the ring's "forgotten men" of his high standard. I submit that Moore is my selection to whip Jack Kearns' spoiler but not until he has whipped into the ring the best conditioned Maxim we've ever seen.
