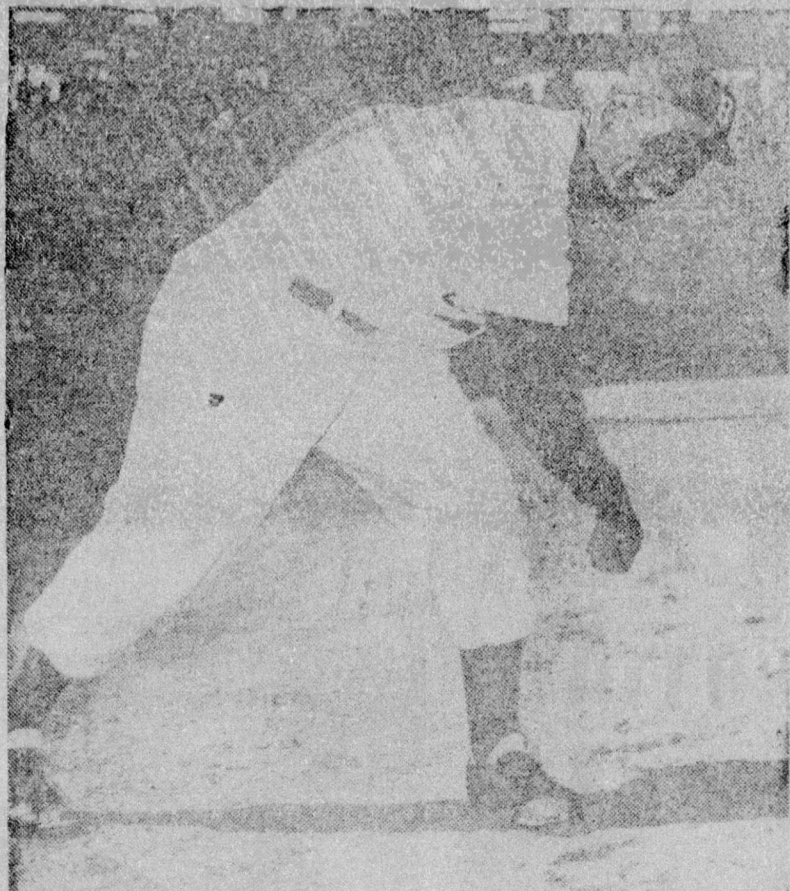
FUNERAL RITES PENDING FOR ERNEST THORPE

New Golden Jubilee Ford Tractor

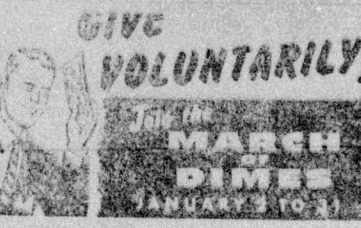

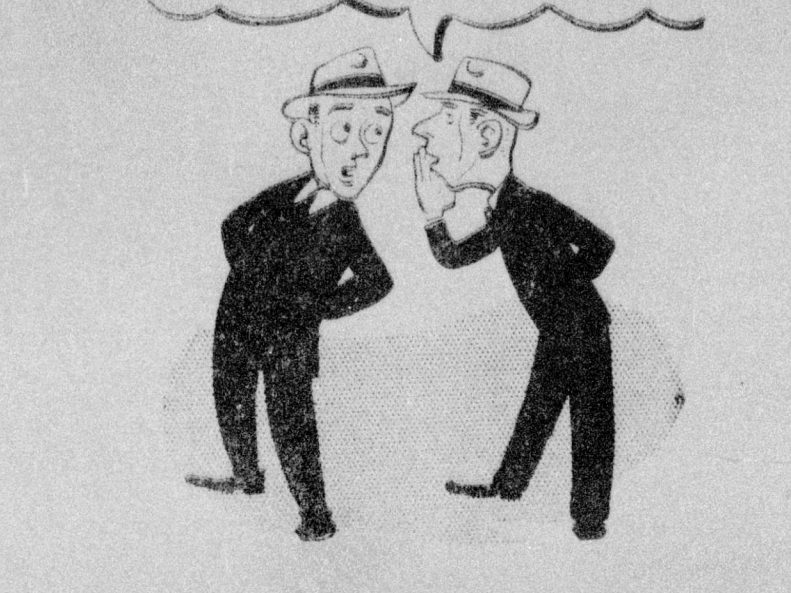
Test Tube March
