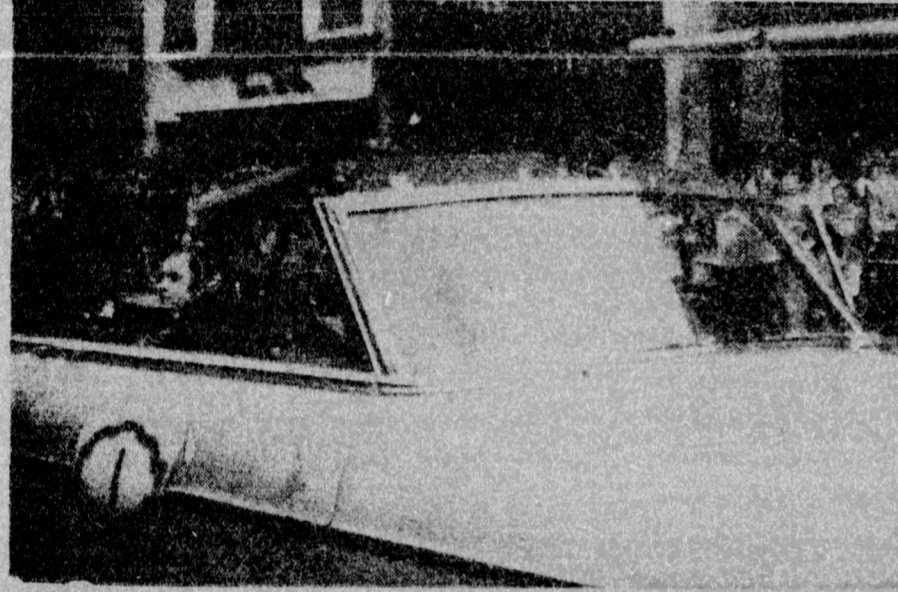


N.C. SOLDIER ONE OF FORTY KILLED IN CRASH

Mystery Blast Shatters Statesville Woman's House

3 UNINJURED AS BLAST HITS WIDOWS HOUSE

Woman Declares Try Made to Blow Up Her Home; Gives No Cause

STATESVILLE — A thunderous explosion shattered windows and blasted a hole in the ground in front of the home of a local widow who claims someone was trying to "blow up" her home Monday night. Three persons residing in the home of 45-year-old Mrs. Odie Corry escaped injury in the blast, reportedly caused by explosion of dynamite. The explosion, which woke Mrs. Corry from a deep sleep, was heard over a large section of the city, and did several hundred dollars worth of damage to the Corry home, which is located about five blocks from an exclusive white residential neighborhood. The blast was centered in the front yard of the Corry home in the Rabbittown all-Negro section here and Mrs. Corry, her daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. John Moore were left temporarily homeless by the incident. Local Police Captain T. G. Kyles said that Mrs. Corry could give no reason why anyone (Continued on page 8)

RALEIGH ELKS TO BUILD NEW HOME FOR LODGE

Planning Underway For New Fidelity Lodge Construction Project
RALEIGH — Fidelity Lodge No. 277, Improved Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks (BPOE), has projected a building program in which a new \$30,000 building will replace the present quarters of the lodge here. The building program, recommended by the post's Exalted Ruler, Alphonzo A. Vance, has been approved by the lodge and is scheduled to get underway upon completion of planning. During a recent meeting of Lodge Vance was installed as Exalted Ruler for the ninth consecutive time. Previous to this he served during 1938-39 as Exalted Ruler. In 1949 he succeeded L. S. Wilcox who guided the lodge for twelve years. During the time Mr. Wilcox served he was instrumental in giving the local lodge its present home at 619 East Ditch Street. Wilcox also served as District Deputy and State Financial Director of Elks. Since Vance has been exalted ruler the lodge has doubled its membership. Also the Recreational Center has been rededicated at a cost of \$1500. This building is used by young people for recreational activities and other groups for different purposes. Mr. Vance is a member of the Trustee Board of Elks of North Carolina, a member of the Board of Directors of the Wake Co-Operative Store, and a member and spokesman of the deacon board of the M. A. N. 'BURGLAR KING' AGAIN IN HANDS OF LAW OFFICERS

Solution to Crimes In 2 States Seen Following Capturing of Culprit
CHARLOTTE — A 35-year-old fugitive with an imposing record of past convictions and current charges of breaking and entering, burglary, larceny and arson in that city, in addition, he is wanted on at least 11 counts here and faces house-breaking charges in Raleigh, Salisbury, Belmont and Rock Hill, S. C. While awaiting March trial in Stanly County Superior Court, the Albemarle police turned Moody over to Charlotte police in order to clear up the charges against him here. Local police said that Moody struck here between Oct. 2, immediately after his escape from the prison camp, and Dec. 23 and that 11 cases have already been cleared up involving him and that 12 additional cases in which he is a suspect are pending. About \$3,000 in clothing, which, along with jewelry, police said was Moody's specialty, has been uncovered in connection with the local break-ins. Det. Capt. W. A. McCall said that other clothing found in Charlotte had been stolen from Rock Hill, Raleigh and Belmont. Goldsboro Soldier One of Forty Killed In Plane Crash

LOGAN, Utah — A North Carolina native, veteran of service with United Nations forces in Korea, was one of the 40 killed when the Army-chartered C-46 transport plane in which they were home-bound crashed high in the Wasatch Mountain near here last Wednesday. Listed as one of the 37 Army men among the victims was Pfc. John H. King whose home address is 607 Canal St., Goldsboro, N. C. Preliminary investigations made when the wreckage of the plane was discovered after a five-day search Monday revealed that the giant aircraft, carrying a crew of three and the Army men, crashed into a mountain peak upon failure to regain altitude. The wreckage of the plane, with bodies and debris scattered over a wide area, was found near a 10,000-foot-high mountain peak, into which it evidently ploughed in an effort to regain its course. The air ship, reportedly was flying reverse course to its previously-established direction. The Goldsboro soldier victim and the other servicemen victims in the crash were being returned from Korea in the Army's replacement plan. His destination was Ft. Jackson, S. C. where he would have been granted a furlough to visit relatives in Goldsboro and vicinity. The Carolinian was unable to learn what disposition was to be made of the remains. Funeral and memorial rites are being planned in the Goldsboro area, however, pending complete investigation of the tragedy.
