Not too long ago the Trade School at Hampton was regulated to a technically trained head whose job it was to efficently see that the trade school supplied a practical training which would equip its trades graduates to immediately qualify as two - third journeymen. This job was well done under the guidance of a trade school director and various departmental heads of its then eleven trades and the School of Building Construction.

Now with the trend in the trades at Hampton towards teacher training under the School of Education its trade school graduates are decidedly handicapped. The conception of a tradesmen as envisioned by the School of Education is certain to be unfavorable to training a good tradesman because liberal arts personnel in the School of Education are beyond the scope of their training, interests and appreciation. And of course, in consequence we have the prevailing fustration at Hampton of a muddled trades training program and small enrollment of students in

And we hope the trustees will reflect back a few years and justiv evaluate the place Hampton's trade school played in giving the Institute its prestibe throughout educational circles. In his inaugural address the new governor of North Corolina, William B. Umstead, gave a blueprint for continued progress in the State's governmental functions. His statements were general. on the whole, as is customary in inougural addresses; however the broad outlines of the program presented are sound and will doubtless be elaborated upon as time goes on, and with specific proposals, such as a 10 per cent increase in the teacher salary scole for example. Another laudable proposal in the field of public education, and one which we hope will be closely followed up, we quote directly from the Governor's address:

"I recommend that sufficient funds be provided to employ properly qualified attendance person- school for feebleminded whites at the Butner innel sufficient in number children of the Negro titution.

Of special interest to CAROLINIAN readers was the Governor's pronouncement on the subject of facilities for the mentally ill and deficient - a subject which has been brought to their attention in both the news and the editorial columns several times recently, as well as over a period of years. Pointing out the inefficiency of the Caswell Training School for feebleminded white children, he said, "It is not now and never has been a 'training 'school.' WASHINGTON D. C. (Glob) all - The new era began here last Tuesday, January 20, when Dwight David Eisenhower was sworn in as President of the United States It was a glorious occasion for many, but for others it was a sad one. The thousands of Government employees and officials who were a part of the New Deal and Fair Deal Administrations that ruled for 20 years, bowed out, not with grace, but with obvious refuciant bittessiess.
