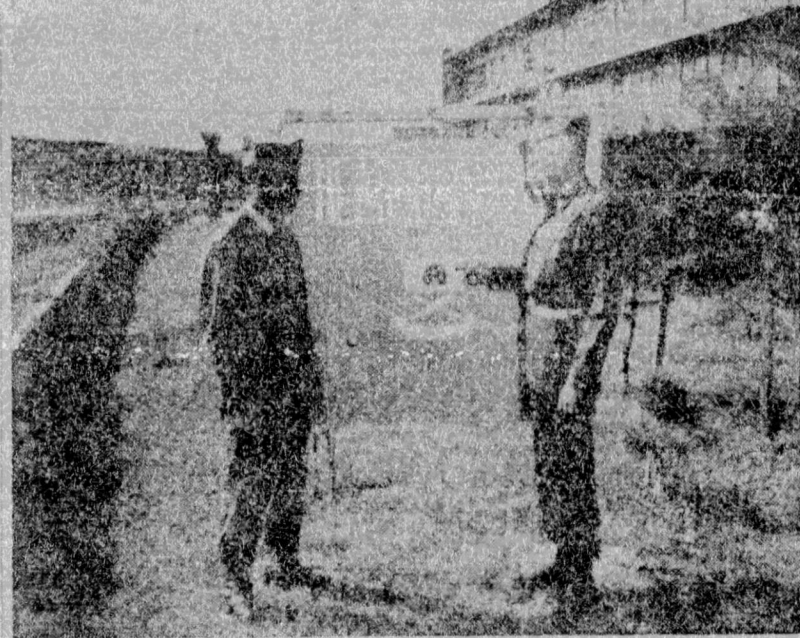

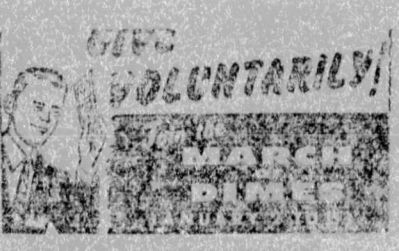

TAX NOTICE LIST YOUR 1953 RALEIGH TOWNSHIP AND CITY OF RALEIGH TAXES BEGINNING JANUARY 2ND IN Basement Wake County Courthouse. All other townships will be listed with the list taker in your respective township. List your real estate, all personal property including automobiles and dogs. All male persons between the ages of 21 and 50 years of age are required to list poll tax. The law requires that taxes be listed in the month of January. A penalty of 10% will be added for failure to list. List now and avoid this penalty. More help has been added to take care of listing without causing you too much delay.
