GARDEN TIME

MOST VEGETABLE CROPS being used for decomposition and especially the leafy vegetables, require heavy fertilization in order to induce rapid growth which is necessary for high table quality. Nobody wants to eat tough, stringy vegetables and it should not be necessary.

Garden soils should contain enough organic matter to make them porous and easy to work and to retain moisture. In the farm garden this is usually supplied by applications of stable manure. If stable manure is unavailable, the organic matter may be supplied by turning under green crops such as rye, clover, soybeans or even straw or sawdust. Whatever material is used to supply the organic matter, it should be an element of the soil.

As well as an organic matter, should be applied long in advance so that the other materials are decomposed before the vegetable crops are planted. The reason is that the bacteria which decompose the organic matter in the soil require a ready supply of nitrogen to carry on their work. In order to get it they take it out of the soil which leaves a nitrogen deficiency which in turn has a bad effect on any crop which is planted at that time. The nitrogen used by the bacteria is not lost. As soon as decomposition is completed, it is released and is available again for the use of crops. I have seen many gardens which appeared to be rich, and they were rich in organic matter in which the crops were making poor growth chiefly because the available nitrogen was

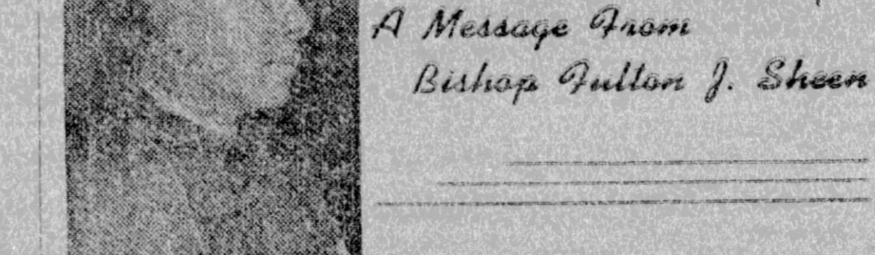

Well-Known TV Preacher Discusses Purity

HOW INSTRUCT our youth on the subject of purity? What is purity?

Purity is reverence paid to the mystery of sex. In every mystery there are two elements: one visible, the other invisible. Sex is a mystery too, because it has these two characteristics. Sex is something known to everyone, and yet sex is something hidden from everyone.

The known element is that everyone is either male or female. The invisible, hidden, mysterious element in sex is its capacity for creativeness—a sharing in some way of the Creative Power of God.

AS GOD'S LOVE is the creative principle of the universe, so God willed that the love of man and woman should be the creative principle of the family. This power of human beings to beget one to their image and likeness is something like God's creative power by which He made us to His image and likeness.

Because of the reverence which envelops this mysterious power which came from God, mankind has always felt that it ought to be used only by a special sanction from God. That is why traditionally marriage has been associated with religious rites—to bear witness to the fact that it has been approved by God.

CERTAIN POWERS may be used only in certain relationships. What is lawful in one relationship is not lawful in another. The "creativity" of man and woman is lawful under certain relationships sanctioned by God, but not apart from that mysterious relationship called marriage.

Who then are the pure? THE PURE ARE those who have such a reverence for the mystery of creativeness that they will suffer no schism between the use of the power to beget and its divinely ordained purpose, namely the raising of children for the Kingdom of God. Those things which God hath joined together, the pure would never separate.

PURITY IS NOT just physical intactness as the pagans believed. In the maid it is a firm resolve never to use her power until God shall send her a husband, and in the man it is the steadfast desire to await upon God's will that he have a wife for the use of God's purpose.

In this sense, true marriages are made in heaven, for when heaven makes them, body and soul never pull in opposite directions. The physical aspect which is known to everybody as sex is never alienated from the invisible mysterious aspect which is hidden from everyone, save the one willed by God to share in it with God's sanction and in God's own good time.

Suburban Advantages. Should you decide to build your new home in a new suburb or in the country, you'll find lots more plentiful than in the city. You can probably have greater flexibility of house design. Property taxes will be lower. Living conditions will be cleaner.

However, don't fail to consider the disadvantages. In many cases both water and sewer systems must be provided by the property owner. Although lots cost less, assessments are made for local improvements. Distance to schools and offices is often great and there is generally a lack of good public transportation. Fire protection services may be lacking, too.

After you decide on the location, you will be ready to look for a piece of property. First, size and shape must be considered. A narrow lot will accommodate a two-story house, a wide, fairly shallow lot is suitable for a ranch home, a hilly lot generally calls for a split-level dwelling. Terrain is another important land feature to consider.

Soil condition, which can be determined by having test holes dug, is a land feature that has direct bearing on house construction. Heavy dirt or clay soil is excellent because it is easily excavated with power equipment and holds its shape well while

Building codes are set up to eliminate fire hazards and insure sound construction and good value. City and town codes set certain minimum sizes for yards, rooms and windows, and certain construction standards. FHA-financed homes must conform to state and national regulations governing construction.

What to Watch. Have boundaries described in the deed checked by a surveyor before you buy, to make sure they are correct. Make sure also that the location is the one you understand it to be so you won't build on the wrong lot.

Don't buy a lot until you are legally certain that the title to the land will be clear in your name. It is the legal duty of the seller to furnish you with proof of a clear title.

The validity of a clear title should be insured by a guaranty policy which is the only safeguard that the land is yours. After the policy has been issued, the guaranty company defends any suits brought against the property owner and if there is any loss to him, the company pays for it.

Should you buy a country lot at a tax sale, get a quit claim deed from the owner. Some states permit the owner to redeem the property if you do not obtain this document from him.

Tex Harrison and Sam Jones of NCC led their scoring parade with 20 points each.

College Medic Says Flu Outbreak Is Receding

DURHAM — Dr. Charles D. Watts, director of Student Health Services at North Carolina College, said here last week he believed the "heat of the outbreak of influenza cases has passed."

"Our center is about normal and we're now using only usual number of staff members including nurses," Dr. Watts said.

At the peak of the outbreak on the NCC campus, more than 40 students were confined to the infirmary that normally accommodates only 20. Some six additional nurses were employed to help during the peak period.

At the time of the first outbreak, Dr. Watts and NCC authorities huddled and decided to isolate as many cases as possible to prevent the spread of the "virus" that swept through many parts of the world and that is believed to be mild influenza.

230 Graduate Students Listed at A&T College

GREENSBORO — Two hundred and eighty students have registered for graduate courses at A. and T. College for the winter quarter according to figures released by Dr. F. A. Williams, dean of the Graduate School. Of the three divisions of study including Agricultural Education, Industrial Arts Education and Rural Education, the latter leads the list with a total enrollment of 154 persons. A total of 108 has enrolled for Agricultural Education and 18 are taking courses in the Industrial Arts Education field.

The breakdown shows, further, that 200 of the enrollees are male.

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" BY C. WILSON HARDER

Another great Prime Minister of England, Disraeli, once said, "Lather a man before you shave him." There is a great deal of evidence that this advice has remained as British policy.

And at the present time, it points up one of the most serious situations facing the new Administration.

That situation is briefly this:

In Canada, United States C. W. Harder money is being discounted. This condition is even reflected in the cost of newspaper.

In the meantime in the new Congress, members of the majority party cannot decide among themselves on the merits of scrapping controls, reducing taxes. Despite ample evidence government controls, plus high taxes, have done great injury to the progress of independent business.

Before the election, there was strong agreement that control, high taxes should end now.

Then the British Prime Minister arrives in this nation, has secret conferences.

It may be sheer coincidence, but immediately after these visits, some leaders of the majority party in Congress express themselves that perhaps too much haste should not be exercised in cutting taxes, ending controls.

There are also these facts:

Although the United Kingdom is receiving half of the aid given Europe, supposedly as a measure to help in the common defense, with Russia supposedly the nation that defense against is.

Today in Washington there is wavering even among those who were the loudest opponents of controls, of high taxes, other evils.

It doesn't seem possible that a visit from an elderly politician from England could cause this wavering. In Washington there is a strong sentiment for appointment of a committee to investigate and reveal the extent of foreign influence in government in much the same way that the Communist plans in America are being exposed.

NCC PROFESSOR IS SPEAKER AT NORFOLK EVENT

NORFOLK, Va. (AP) — Dr. Rose Butler Brown last week told 800 persons at Bank Street Baptist Church that America's treatment of the Indians whose land was taken from them while they were pushed back into reservations has cast doubts among other peoples as to our right to guard the secrets of the atom bomb.

Dr. Brown, a professor at North Carolina College, Durham, N. C., was the guest speaker for Founders Day for Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, sponsored by five chapters in the Tidewater area. She was introduced by Mrs. Margaret F. Johnson. The history of the sorority and the five chapters was given by Mrs. E. L. Wingo.

Dr. Brown, formerly professor of education at Virginia State College, Petersburg, Va., stressed the importance of spiritual values as against material things.

"We can acquire property and consider ourselves superior beings," she said. "We people must live by faith and the finer things of life. We must have something to believe in and something to suffer for and if need be to die for to achieve our best self."

The speaker is the wife of the Rev. F. T. Brown, Baptist minister of Durham.
