The serials were further divided into march units spaced three minutes apart. Serials contain approximately 125 vehicles while a march unit contains from 25 to 30 vehicles.

An advance party preceded each column and alerted the police of a cases along the route. As the onyoy approached a reajor city it was met by a motorcycle escorto aid passage through the heavy traffic The convoy passed through Raleigh, N. C., Richmond, Va Fredrick, Md., Harrisburg Pa. and Syracuse, N. Y., without disrupt-ing any traffic to a noticeable degree No acidents resulting in serious injury to civilians or military personnel marred the move

This truth is strikingly borne out by the fact that not one segregated school system has public schools with ratings and standards comparable with any nonsegregated school system. Think how much the children of the south, both black and white,

We have said before and we say again, there is no apparent likelihood that the U.S. Supreme Court will abolish segre gation, but will in all proba bility order the immediate equalization of Negro school facilities. Is there an oracle of sooth sayer in all this region who can tell the south how i can stand the strain of equal ization. Such an order would simply mean total bankruptey for every southern state. Sena tors Clyde Hoey, Willis Smith, Governors Herman Talmadge Jimmy Byrnes and Company notwithstanding, it is not likely the South will see itself bankrupt simply to perpetuate a folly that has already bank rupted its soul.

We repeat, the end of segregation is in sight, whether the end comes this year, next year or during the next five years is of small importance compared to the question, are we
