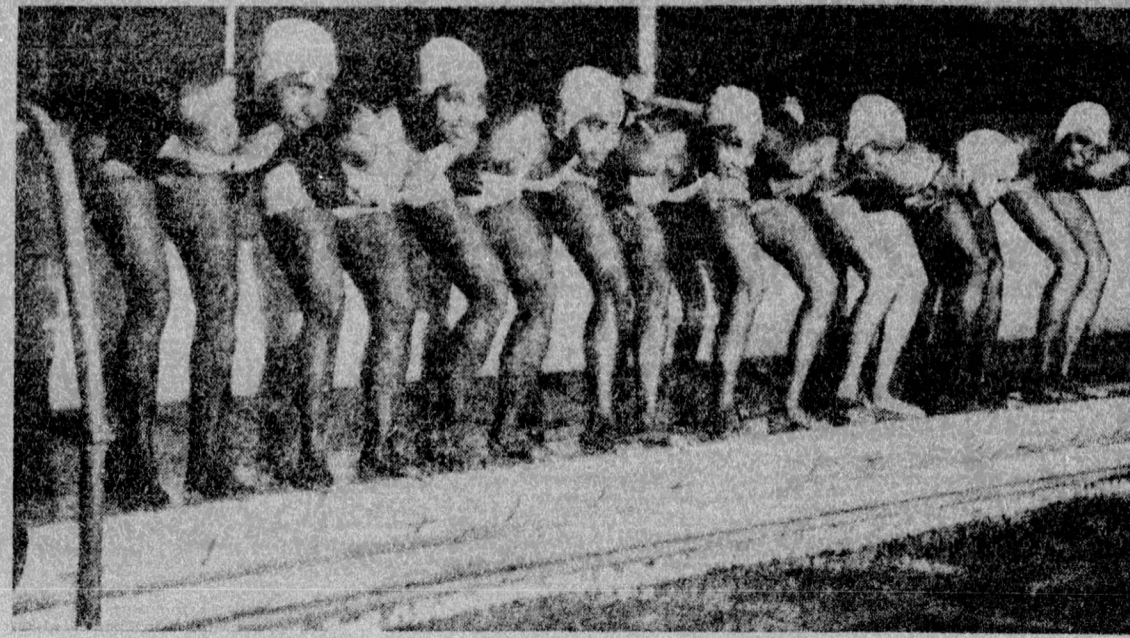
Louisburg Pythians Organized

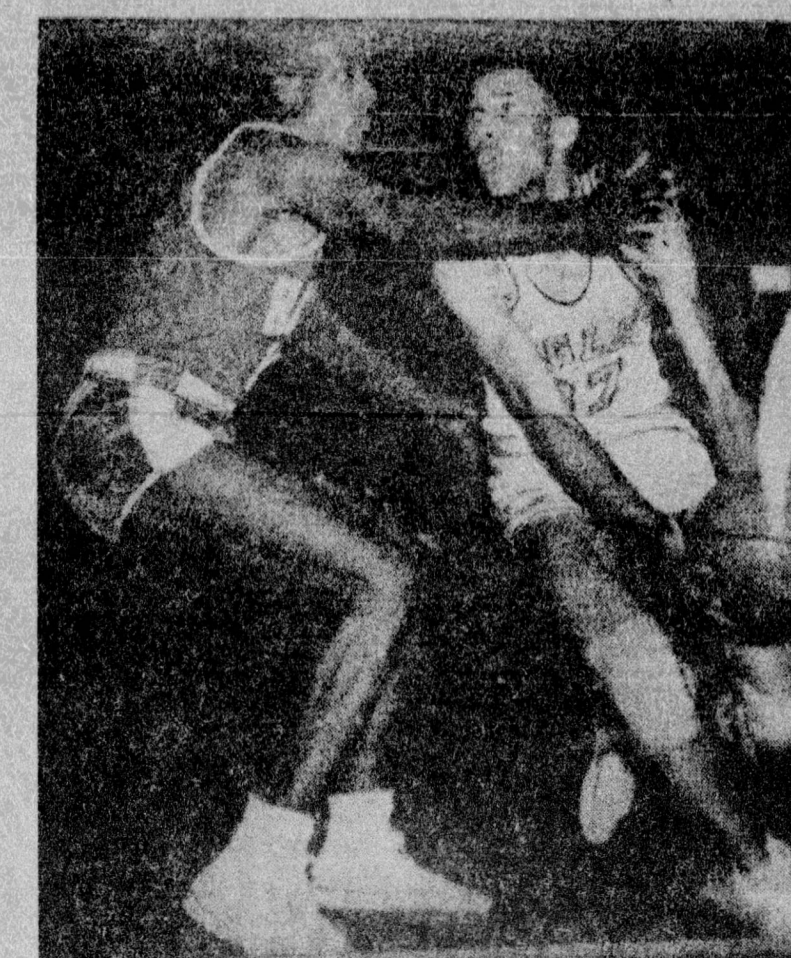
Major Wilson Cited
