MINISTER HANGS SELF IN JAIL; FROM HIGH POINT

Preacher Jailed In Connection With Forgery; Is Victim

SPARTANBURG, S. C. (Special) — A "middle-aged man" who took his own life by hanging himself from a bar in a cell in which he had been confined at the local jail has been identified as a resident of High Point, N. C.

Police report that a man who shared a cell with Rev. Mr. Sanders found the latter sitting on the side of a bunk early Tuesday morning with a chain taken from another bunk snatched tightly around his neck.

Rev. Mr. Sanders had been arrested here for investigation of forgery charges, police say.
