

**LINCOLN UNIVERSITY**, Pa. (UPI) — The Lincoln (Pa.) Lions wrestling team will move into the "big league" March 27 and 28 when it competes in the national tournament of the National Collegiate Athletic Association at State college.

The invitation was extended to Lincoln after the Lions won the Central Intercollegiate Athletic Association championship last year. It marks the third straight year it has earned the first time that a team composed

solely of Negro athletes has received a bid to participate in an NCAA meet.

Coach Bob Gardner has warned his charges that in the calibre of competition in the NCAA meet will be rugged.
