MEDIC HAS 'TIL MAY 4 TO RAISE \$31 THOUSAND

DURHAM — Dr. Judge B. Davis, veteran physician - surgeon of Spruill Springs, was given until May 4 to raise about \$31,000 he allegedly owes the government as income tax for a period covering two years in Federal District Court in session here this week.

Judge Johnson J. Hayes, presiding over the court term, said that Dr. Davis would be let off with "a light fine" if he could raise the funds by the May 4 date.

This action was taken after the regular physician pleaded volentendence to one of three counts charging him with failing to file an income tax report during the years 1945 to 1950.

Noting that Dr. Davis, at 62 years of age is "getting along in years" and that there is a "great need for doctors" Judge Hayes stated that "we will work out something" in event Dr. Davis is not able to raise the full amount of the indebtedness by the appointed date.

Counsel for the noted physician said that his client had already raised some of the funds. Judge Hayes stated "Let him do the best he can. We'll work out something."

N. C. Governor Will Not Talk About Ending Bias

RALEIGH — North Carolina's Governor, William B. Umstead of Durham, has assumed a "no comment" attitude relative to the stand that the state will make if the United States Supreme Court abolishes segregation in public schools in decisions now pending by the high tribunal.

The state's chief executive, who has been ill and bed-ridden since shortly after his inauguration in January, told reporters in a bedside press conference this week that he could speak only "off the record" on the problem of segregation in education.

"MORE IMPORTANT MATTERS" The governor, a Durham lawyer and former member of the U. S. Congress, told the 15 newsmen who gathered at his bedside in the Executive Mansion here last weekend that he preferred not to discuss the possibilities of a favorable (to Negroes) ruling in the school cases. He said he did not "want unnecessarily to stir up racial issues" with what he termed "important public business at hand."

It is generally conceded that the state is preparing for what it would consider an "adverse" ruling from the U. S. Supreme Court (CONTINUED ON PAGE FIVE)
