## Vocational Opportunities Are Keynoted In Annual A & T Event

GREENSBORO — The annual Vocational Opportunity Week program being observed at A. and T. College began on Monday, March 30, featured many leaders in business, industry and agriculture throughout the state. The theme of the current celebration is "Occupational Information — A Door Opener to Vocational Opportunities."

W. J. Kennedy, president of the North Carolina Mutual Life Insurance Company, the largest single Negro business in the world, keynoted the four-day event which will wind up with a television presentation, a summary of the week's activities at 5:00 p. m. on Thursday over the local WFMY-TV Station. He appeared at the first general assembly on Tuesday morning at 10:00 o'clock in the college's Harrison Auditorium and again in the afternoon in a special panel discussion on "Occupational Opportunities in North Carolina."

The Wednesday program consisted of a panel discussion on "Student Preparation for Present and Expanding Opportunities in the Agricultural Field." Among those who participated in the discussion were Lewis Barbee, instructor in Agronomy at the college and president of the college farm, and W. T. Johnson, assistant state supervisor of Vocational Agriculture in Negro Schools. A. W. Solomon, local representative, N. C. Farm Bureau, and R. K. Jones, state extension agent.

Speakers heard at the general assembly on Thursday morning on the subject, "Student Preparation for Expanding Opportunities" included: J. H. Lamm, dean of the School of Engineering at N. C. State College, Raleigh; A. E. Boyington, building contractor, Sanford; Howard Winstead, M. C. Randolph, S. C. State College, Greenville; Nathaniel White, head of Service Printing Company, Durham; and Moses Bellman, American Friends Service Committee, Greensboro.

Later in the afternoon on

Thursday panel discussions on "Making the Best of Your College Education for Future Employment in Engineering," "Training Needs and Job Opportunities in the skilled Occupations," and "Job Opportunities in Business and Commercial Occupations" will be held by the speakers.

The week's program originally planned as a one-day event with two days, "Choosing Your Occupation" and "Finding the Right Job," was extended to a four-day event.

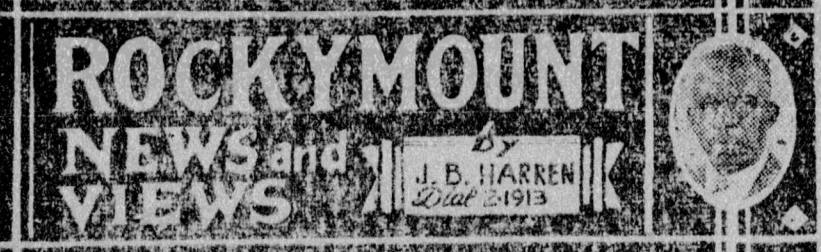
### 28 Colored Priests

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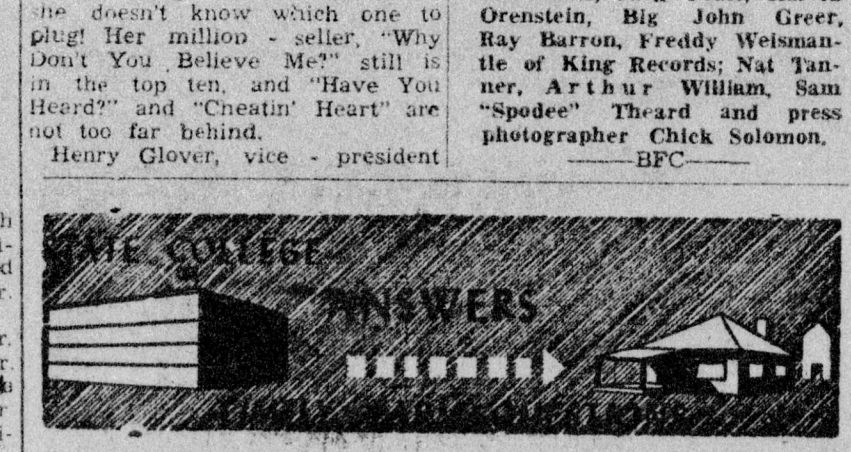

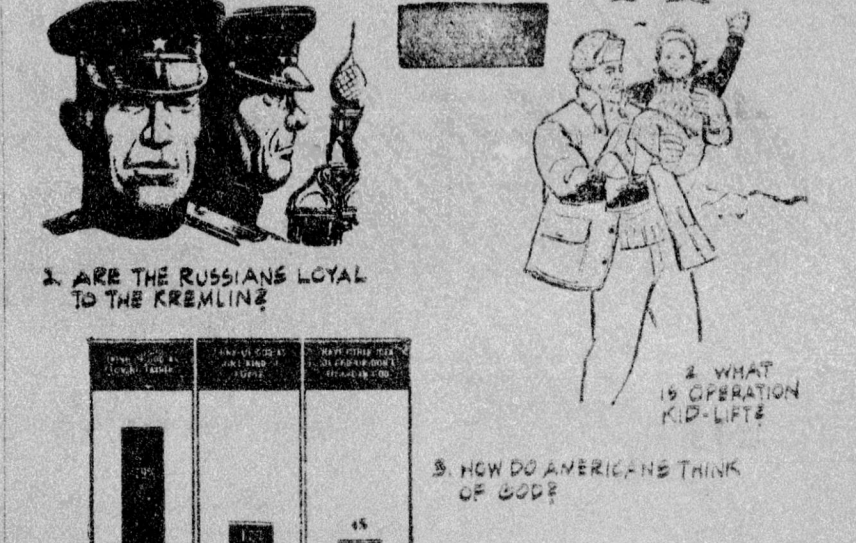

**QUESTION:** "What are the best steps to take in controlling termites?"  
**ANSWER:** The species of termite that causes the most damage in North Carolina is the subterranean termite. This "nesting type" insect buries on wood. But it can not live without moisture. Being a subterranean insect, it lives in the soil, according to George D. Jones, in charge of extension entomology.

The number one step to take in combating termites is to make sure no wooden parts of buildings reach the ground unless they are thoroughly treated. This means that no wooden scraps should be used to fill in areas around the foundation. Stumps and wood scraps should not be left under the building. Wooden supports and foundation walls should rest upon a concrete footing and not be permitted to extend through the concrete to the ground below. Openings in the foundation wall will help remove the moisture under the building, without which the termites will move on to a more desirable location.

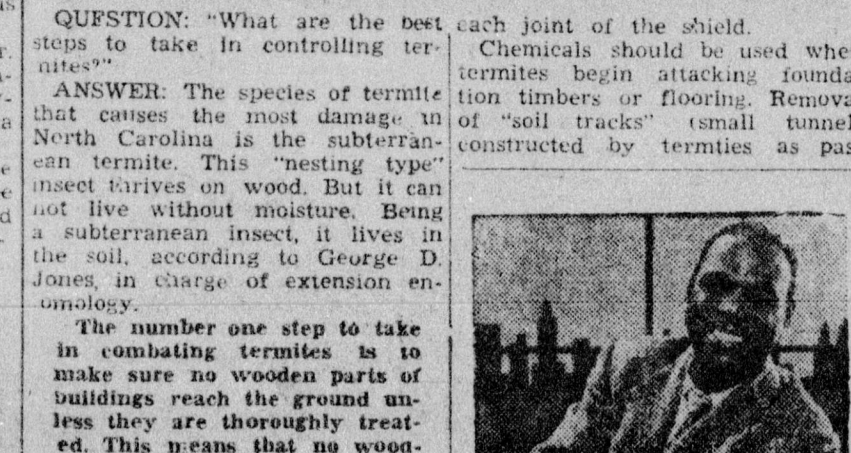
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## Hampton Is Site Of Rec Association Meet
