THE SLOW POKE IS NO TRAFFIC JOKE

RALEIGH — Highway Safety Chief H. D. Jones of the Motor Vehicles Department took a crack today at a little heard from traffic menace—the slow poke.

Jones reviewed last April's fatality and injury score on Tar Heel highways and attributed at least some of them to the too slow drivers.

April 26 of last year was the worst single day for highway deaths, he said, with 11 persons killed. He asked if they weren't the result of a lack of common courtesy on the highway.

Accidents cost \$7,800,000 last April the safety boss reported. On the pedestrian front Jones said deaths were up 250 per cent last April. He especially appealed for citizens to help reduce pedestrian fatalities.

In a general plea for safe driving and walking, including bicycle riders, Jones issued these rules for youngsters.

Observe all signal lights and signs.
Don't stunt.
Never hitch to a moving vehicle.
Never carry another person on your bike.
Walk your bike across busy corners.
Ride single file for safety.
Keep both hands on the handlebars — both eyes ahead.

NC Motorists Keep Patrolmen Alerted

RALEIGH — State Highway Patrolmen arrested 10,159 traffic law violators in February and ordered another 6,371 to appear in court. The arrests and citations were reported today by Col. W. B. Lentz, commanding officer of five troops.

In the report Col. Lentz said his men drove 1,708,832 miles on routine patrol, inspected 152,216 drivers' licenses, investigated 1,597 motor accidents inspected 78,087 vehicles, and handed out 6,917 warning tickets.

During February the troopers investigated 7,589 complaints, weighed 911 vehicles, and extended 17,135 courtesies.

They recovered cars and property valued at \$80,855.00 during the month.
