He is a native of Newark, N. J., and did not play football until he reported to the Teachers as a freshman. The big ex-Rams star is in the Army, stationed at Bolling Air Field. There he played for the last two seasons. Coach Bushong, Gaines of the Teachers said that Wallace talked terms with Cleveland in December and that he understood that he was attempting to secure a hard-earned discharge because he is the one supporter of his family. Wallace was named to the all-USA conference football team as a junior and again as a senior with the Teachers and was named

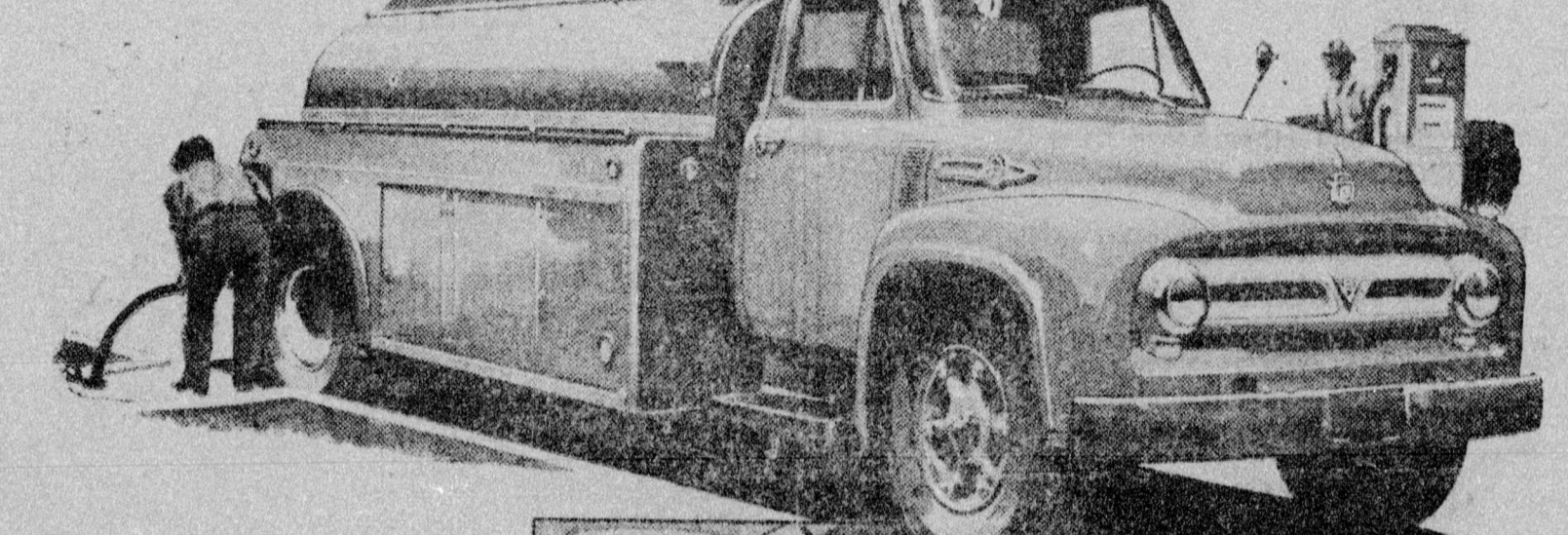
