Race Woman Fights Off White Youth

ROXBORO - A young local white planing mill worker who attemped to criminally assault a Negro woman after abducting her before the eyes of her husband last Friday night, was held for trial on an attempted rape charge following preliminary hearing here Tuesday morning. Emory Sanders Jackson, 23, a

married man who lives in the Roseville community was held in local jail prior to Tuesday's session in lieu of \$2000 bond following his alleged attack upon Mrs. Lucy Talley.

Jackson is said to have driven Lis car up beside Mrs. Talley and her husband Rayfield, Friday night as they walked along Reams Avenue. Jackson asked the Talleys to ride with him and they accepted, Mrs. Talley entering the back seat of the two-seated car and her husband climbing into the frost seat with Jackson.

As Jackson neared the Talley home, it was related, he stopped the car, allowing the husband to disbark. When the wife tried to leave the back seat, however, Jackson is alleged to have slammed the door shut imprisoning the woman while he drove

With Mrs. Talley trying to wrest her way out of the auto, Jackson is said to have driven about three miles into a rural area where he climbed into the rear seat and attempted to criminally assault the woman. Being foiled in the atterapt. Jackson then drove the woman back to a nearby settlement where she was allowed to leave


Jackson was arrested at his home Saturday morning and was identified as the assailant by both Mr. and Mrs. Talley. He admitted the charges followand questioning by local officials.




