## Princeville Again Site Of Bi-race Morals Arrests

**PRINCEVILLE** — Reports emanating from the office of Chief of Police Otley Leary here picture the 73 Negro town of Princeville, situated across the Tar River a hotbed of interracial sexual activity since the arrest of two white men and a colored woman on morals charges recently.

Mrs. Emma T. Whitehead recently was convicted of "maintaining a house of prostitution" and released under \$500 bond pending sentencing April 22nd. Two 48-year-old white men, Elmer E. Jefferson and Joe T. Muse of Chocowinity and Washington, N. C., respectively, were charged "entering a house for the purpose of prostitution and prostitution" and upon conviction were fined.

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# SAY MAN KILLED HIS MOTHER, 70, NIECE, 3

**WADESBORO** — A man is being held under guard in the hospital here, this week, pending the outgrowth of investigation of charges that he murdered his 70-year-old mother and then slew his 3-year-old niece.

Sheriff Ben Rivers and Rural Policeman Norwood Preete, along with Anson County Coroner H. H. Leavitt are investigating the brutal pistol-shot slaying of Mrs. Florence Liles and her granddaughter, little Barbara Ann Bennett, Clarence Liles, son of the woman victim, is being held under guard on charges of suspicion of murder since the dual murder was discovered early Monday morning.

Mrs. Liles and the small child were found sprawled across their bed by Henry Liles, another son of the aged victim, early Monday. Clarence Liles was also found in the house located in the Bethel community near here. He was found to be in a coma with a gun, apparently the death weapon, lying nearby.

Preliminary investigation revealed that the deaths both of which were result of wounds inflicted by a .22 calibre pistol, had occurred some time before the discovery of the victims.

Members of the Liles and Bennett families and acquaintances could give no reason that Clarence Liles could have had to shoot and kill the

## Exploitation Of Hi-School Athletes In NC Protested

**RALEIGH** — A well-known North Carolina secondary school sports figure, J. Worthington Campbell, has "sounded off" against what he feels is exploitation of young (school) athletes by "unscrupulous individuals."

Mr. Campbell's protest against this "exploitation" is based on a situation which arose shortly after a group, with the blessing of the state, formulated what it felt an equitable program for administration of high school athletics.

One of the fallacies in the state group's program is noted in Mr. Campbell's protest which was received in letter form by the sports editor of this newspaper this week.

 Dear Sir:

Several months ago the Board of Education of the State of North Carolina set out to regulate the athletic program of the public schools of the State. There are those who feel that the Board went too far in its regulations. Possibly, time alone will prove or disprove that contention. But it is increasingly obvious that some power of broad interest should supervise the program of athletics that opportunity of exploitation of youth may be minimized.

This is an attempt to cite one example to support the idea that young athletes are often exploited by unscrupulous individuals.

The Inter-County Athletic Association sponsored a basketball tournament for both boys and girls in March. The preliminaries were held in Wadesboro, Saturday, Mar. 7. The semi-finals were held in Landis, Wednesday evening, Mar. 8.

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# College Students May Revolt

**MILLER MUST DIE!!**

**RALEIGH** — Because he saw no reason to further review the records in the trials and hearings, NC's Governor William B. Umstead Wednesday afternoon removed the last ray of hope for a 22-year-old convicted Negro killer, making it mandatory for him to pay the supreme penalty in the gas chamber at Central Prison here Friday morning.

The state's chief executive failed to intervene in the case of Lafayette Miller, young Beaufort County man accused of killing a white farmer early last year. Miller had been sentenced to death in the electric chair, but efforts of his attorneys kept him on Death Row for a year.

A final effort by counsel for Miller Wednesday proved fruitless when the governor announced his decision not to intervene. Counsel for the youth, who was captured by highway patrolmen as he drove his alleged victim's car with the victim's wife in the trunk, conferred with the governor some few hours before the decision was rendered.

Throughout his stay on Death Row, Miller contended that the wife of the victim was the murderer and that the two of them — he and the wife — were "going away together" when captured.

### ST. AUGUSTINE'S STUDENTS FED UP WITH PLIGHT

**Group To Unify Protest; Plans Fight 'til End**

**RALEIGH** — For the past two weeks a group of students at Saint Augustine's College here, announcing themselves "fed up" with what they term the "dictatorial manner" in which the school is administered, have been carrying on an "underground" movement through which they seek to gain full student-body support for what they plan to be a revolt to shock the school's administration out of its apathy as concerns the desires of the student body.

Under the cover of night, the student leaders of the proposed unity plan, have plastered the campus of the local Episcopal school with hand-printed handbills, scrying tactics employed in the administration of the institution.

For many two weeks these multi-colored handbills asking "WHERE IS OUR PRIEST?" and pleading with the administration to "LET THE STUDENT COUNCIL ACT" have appeared mysteriously on buildings, plants and automobiles (including that of President Harold Trigg) and as mysteriously, they have disappeared at the approach of the next day.

Efforts by this newspaper to secure some of the bills bore fruit this week when some few of the bills were acquired by usually accepted and highly-ethical methods.

The handbills which came into the hands of this publication and the writer as well as information received here indicate that:

- 1—The student body feels that administration's rules are too many and too strict. Thus the handbill reading "WHY ALL THE RULES?"
- 2—The student council is being inactivated. Thus the handbill: "LET THE STUDENT COUNCIL ACT"
- 3—The administration of the school is dictatorial. Thus the bill: "WE WANT DEMOCRACY"

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## Primary Voting Ends With Negroes Still In Running

**RALEIGH** — As primary voting continued last Saturday and through Tuesday of this week the complexities of several political pictures in cities and towns throughout the state took on a positive change.

In most cases Negro candidates who were novices in the game of politics made no outstanding showings in their quests for nomination to public offices.

A brief resume of the picture as it will look on Tuesday, May 5th when general election balloting is to be the main issue thru the state follows:

### TAYLOR ONTO RALEIGH BALLOT

**RALEIGH** — In Raleigh's Saturday primary voting, Attorney Herman L. Taylor polled 1333 votes to remain in the race for nomination to the City Council. Tenth man in a field of 14 eligible for placement on the May 5th ballot, Attorney Taylor showed greatest power in the predominantly-Negro precincts, yet indicated that he has not yet getting power throughout the city.

In Saturday's Raleigh voting also the Rev. C. C. Jones was eliminated from the general election ballot, polling only 633 votes.

### SUPPORTS WHITE CANDIDATE

Early this week, Rev. Mr. Jones indicated, that he would not turn his support to Attorney Taylor's quest for the city post. Instead the Baptist minister - school principal announced his intention of supporting the candidacy of a white aspirant who placed just slightly above Taylor in the primary balloting.

G. T. Grigsby is a candidate for the post of city commissioner in Holly Springs. A Hampton graduate building contractor and former instructor of veterans' vocational courses, Mr. Grigsby is married and the father of one child. A novice in politics, Mr. Grigsby is president of the Farmers and Veterans Credit Union, chairman of a PTA group, a Sunday school teacher and trustee of the Baptist Church. He is also chairman of his town's division of the Swift Creek Community Chest and was first Negro in the state to obtain a master plumbers license by taking the state examination.

### HAMPTON TOP MAN IN C'BORO VOTE

M. Hampton, incumbent, led the entire slate of 19 aspirants for city post here as a comparatively light vote was cast in Tuesday's primary. Dr. Hampton collected over 3400 of the total of 5440 votes cast in Tuesday's primary which saw at least five of the local incumbents for the council assured nomination in the general election next Tuesday.

Greensboro Attorney Kenneth Lee retained a place on the general election ballot, running at 13th man in the 14 who will be listed.

### DEVANE POWERFUL AT FAYETTEVILLE

**FAYETTEVILLE** — Incumbent city councilman Dr. W. J. Devane showed power at the polls Tuesday as he polled 1269 votes to keep his name on the ballot for the general election.
